THE GOLDMAN KIMBROUGH LINE

The editor wishes to share a letter he received from Mr. R. L. James which I'm sure he doesn't mind my sharing with you. Though I have never met Mr. James, he has indicated to me that he has a very keen sense of history.

Dear Mr. Kimbrough:

I doubt that I can be of much help to you if any. I of course don't know just what information you obtained from the Kimbroughs in Tuscumbia and Russellville, but first I wish to advise you that my mother was not a descendant of the Kimbroughs. However, she did have a maternal aunt, Jane Barrett (1817-1902), who married James M. Kimbrough (1816-1889). The Mack Kimbrough whom you saw in Russellville is their grandson. In other words Mack Kimbrough's father and my mother were first cousins, being sister's children. Mack Kimbrough had an Uncle Dave Kimbrough, who had a wonderful memory and knew much family history. A big part of what I know about this branch of the Kimbroughs, I learned through Cousin Dave. According to him, his grandparents, Goldman and Mary (Allen) Kimbrough came from Middle Tennessee in 1817 to Franklin County, Alabama. He said Goldman Kimbrough served in the Revolutionary War (from North Carolina, I believe) and I think he said under Gen. Daniel Morgan. After living in Franklin County for some time, Goldman Kimbrough and his family removed to Warrior River Area of Alabama, either, I think, in what is now Walker or Tuscaloosa County. I don't know the date of his death, but it must have been before 1835. Goldman's widow and children moved back to Franklin where some of her relatives, the Allens, lived.



Goldman and Mary Allen Kimbrough had the following children: 1. Goldman, Jr., who married Elizabeth Grisham, 2. Richard, who married a Morrison, 3. Marmaduke, who married his cousin, Elizabeth Allen, 4. Georgia, who I believe, either married a Madlock or Matlock, 5. Bryant (?) who died young and unmarried, 6. James M. who married Jane Barrett -- and there were two or three girls. I believe one of them married her cousin, an Allen, and I think one married either a Merritt or Meredith. Please understand that I don't know the exact order of the ages of Goldman and Mary (Allen) Kimbrough's children but was advised that James M. (Uncle Jim) was the youngest child.

I know that Goldman Kimbrough, Jr. and his wife lived and died a few miles N. E. of Russellville. They had a son, John N. Kimbrough, who married a daughter of John Weatherford, one of the early Sheriffs of Franklin Co.

Another son, Orman Kimbrough, whose wife was, I believe, an Enlow, and there were two or three girls one of whom married Sam Robinson.

Marmaduke Kimbrough and his wife, Elizabeth Allen, lived in Franklin County and had several children. I have been told that he died long before his wife. Their son, James Allen Kimbrough (1830-1923) was considered one of the most pious men and devout Christians who ever lived in Franklin County. He wore a nickname, "Jim Poney."

Marmaduke and Elizabeth (Allen) Kimbrough had several other children, one a daughter, married John Rauhoff. Their grandson, Millard Rauhoff, was a lawyer at Blue Island, Ill. and was very much interested in the history of the Kimbrough family. I saw him in 1948 and later I had quite a bit of correspondence with him. He was a very intelligent man and appeared to be of fine principle. But he died in the early 1940's. He had a brother, Paul Rauhoff, who was a postmaster at Blue Island, Ill., if I remember right.

I think Richard Kimbrough, son of Goldman and Mary (Allen) Kimbrough, married his wife, Miss Morrison, either in western Kentucky or Illinois. I am told that one of their sons was at one time mayor of Danville, Ill., but I don't know just how long ago.

No, I never knew your grandfather Kimbrough.

I had a brother, Lee James, who was in clothing business in Opelika for a number of years. He died in 1952, and is buried in Opelika. I have another brother, L. L. James, who was Superintendent of schools in Roanoke, Alabama (1919-1957). He still lives there but I have not seen him since 1949.

Mr. Kimbrough, I wish you success in your research on the Kimbrough family. I can truly say, that on the whole the Kimbroughs I have personally known were and are people of fine intelligence and some possessed wonderful memories.

Please excuse mistakes. I am prone to omit so many words, when I am trying to write.

(Note: You who have information on this line realize that Mr. James has provided some wonderful information. Many of those whom he named are known to me through other research. The grandson of Richard Kimbrough who was mayor of Danville, Illinois would provide data to fill a Quarterly of very interesting events. A copy of his will is filed in courthouse at Montgomery as he owned land in Montgomery County. I have two copies that this E. R. E. Kimbrough wrote to Mrs. W. B. Ardery. I hope to cover them in a future Quarterly.

I hope that you are interested in this branch of the Kimbrough family, which is a branch of the Marmaduke Kimbrough family of North

Carolina, will come forth with your data so that we can carry through on at least some of the sub-branches.

Bradley B. Kimbrough had other children by both wives but I do not have  
proof as to  
their names. By the process of elimination in Tallapoosa Co. there were  
one or two

Kimbroughs that came early that I cannot tie to other branches of the  
family. One

of these was a William Thomas Kimbrough who m. Martha A. C. Womack the  
16th day of

June 1844, in Tallapoosa Co., Ala. by John Wheelys, J.P.

The 1830 Census in Georgia has not yet yielded the location of Bradley B.  
Kimbrough.



In 1830 he sold his lands in Greene Co., Georgia and in 1835 he was in the Whitesville section of Harris Co., Ga. Bradley Kimbrough was a witness to a deed made from grantor Charles L. Kennon to grantee John Patillo executed 11th day of Oct. 1835. From Book C, page 58, Bradley Kimbrough purchased from F. C. Powell 202« acres, lot 306, 20th District, for \$1,000.00. In 1837 Bradley Kimbrough and Thomas Kimbrough with Wiley White, George B. White, and Thomas Saddler were members of the Board of Trustees who purchased the land for the First Methodist Church in Harris Co., at Whitesville. On the 13th day of July 1838 Bradley Kimbrough, of the county of Tallapoosa and State of Ala. sold his lot of 202« acres to Wiley Ray. Bradley Kimbrough obtained land grant,

Warrant No. 7030 and 7031 for land in Tallapoosa Co., March 29, 1838. On the 18th day of Feb. 1843 he sold the two tracts that he had obtained as grants at the price he had paid for them and that is the last account I have of Bradley B. Kimbrough. In all transactions in Greene and Harris Cos., Georgia and in Tallapoosa County, Ala., his signature was Bradley B. Kimbrow. Deed Book "A", page 161, Tallapoosa Co. Ala.

On Feb. 17, 1843, the day before he sold his land that he had obtained by grants he joined his son Thomas W. Kimbrough in making a marriage bond in the pinal sum of two hundred dollars to his excellency Benjamin Fitzpatrick, Governor of the State of Ala. The marriage was noted above executed by Semoon Goolsby, register, 23rd Feb. 1843.

CRAWFORD (Laurus Crawfordiana)

Memorials of the Branch of the Crawford Family Which Comprises the  
Descendants of John Crawford of Virginia 1660-1883, with Notices of  
Allied  
Families, New York 1883.

This was published by Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt.

Mr. Thomas Crawford, a renowned antiquary and historian, and professor in  
the  
University of Edinburgh, thus accounts for the origin of his family name.

The common ancestor of the Crawfords was one Mackornock, who, as the  
story goes,  
signalized himself at an engagement by the water of the Crea in Galloway,  
by discovery  
of a ford, which gave a signal advantage to his party. The story may  
carry some  
truth, for it is observed that most of our surnames at first were taken  
from places,  
accidents, and the most remarkable actions of a man's life, but this I  
waive as not  
being so well attested. "Ref. from G. Crawford's History of Shire of  
Renfrow, its  
nobility, gentry, etc. to Paisley".

Arthur in his dictionary of Names, speaks of the name Crawford as assumed  
by a  
proprietor of land and barony of Crawford, in Lanarkshire, Scotland. The  
extreme  
ancestor of the ancient family of Crawford, in Scotland, was Reginald,  
youngest son of  
Alan, the fourth Earl of Richmond. He seems to have accompanied David,  
the First, to  
the north, and to have received extensive grants of land in Strath Cluyd  
of  
Clydesdale, where his immediate descendants adopted the name of Crawford,  
then forming  
one of the largest baronies in Scotland, and signifying in Gaelic, "The  
Pass of Blood"  
from cur, bloody, and ford, a pass of way, as commemorative, probably, of  
some  
sanguinary conflict between the Aborigines and the Roman invaders. The  
name has been  
derived by others from Crodh and port, pronounced crofort, signifying a  
"sheltering  
place for cattle".

Mr. George Crawford, in his sketches of family history embraced in the History of Renfrowshire remarks; "The first using this surname I have found is Galfridue de Crawford, who is witness in a charter by Roger, Bishop of Andrews, to the Abbey of Kelso, declaring that monastery independent of the Episcopal See; which charter has probably been about the year 1189, when Roger was elected Bishop of St. Andrews, in the reign of William. So it is clear that the family of Crawford seated at a place of that name, in the county of Lanark, and from their hereditary lands took designation, when fixed surnames came commonly to be used."

"Sir William Wallace's mother was a Crawford of Crawford-moor, Scotland".

John Crawford, immigrant came as widower probably first settled in James City county and afterwards New Kent. He did not arrive in Virginia previous to 1623.

In the Bible of Rev. Wm. Crawford of Louisa Co., Va. he wrote Wm. Crawford was son of a B. That David Crawford belonged to a slave-holding aristocracy of the Old

In 1770 they removed to the residence which is still (1883) in the hands of a descendant (Dr. Nathan H. Crawford) being known as "Locust Grove" and situated one and one-half miles from the county Court House of Louisa Co.

Mr. Yancey was "represented to me a man of irascible temperament, indefatigably industrious and stirring". "The Yanceys were broad shouldered and corpulent." JUDGE WM. BRECKENRIDGE ARDERY - HUSBAND OF JULIA SPENCER ARDERY

William Breckenridge Ardery, Circuit Judge of the 14th Judicial District of Ky. since 1935 when elected to fill an unexpired term. He won re-election 1939, 1945, 1951, 1957, and 1963, at present serving his 30th year. This district until 1960 included the Fiscal Court of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and Franklin Co., along with three other Bluegrass Cos., of Bourbon, Scott and Woodford Cos. In 1960 the Kentucky Assembly removed Franklin co. from this four county Judicial District, making it a



separate district because of the great volume of work, it being the 48th, leaving the three Bluegrass Cos. as the 14th over which Judge Ardery now has jurisdiction.

Judge Ardery was born at the old family homestead location on the Lexington Road near Paris, Bourbon Co., to Wm. and Ellen (Adair) Ardery, Aug. 11, 1887. He received his education in the private schools of Professors Costello and Yorkes and Centre College with LLB degree, 1909; practiced law in Bourbon Co. and represented Bourbon Co. in the General Assembly 1923-31; candidate for Governor 1931; Commonwealth's Attorney 14th Judicial District 1931-35. Kerr's History of Kentucky

This history carries two biographical sketches on Kimbroughs as follows:

Vol. IV - p. 283 - Daniel R. Kimbrough of Kimbrough and Van Hook Real Estate and Insurance, Cynthiana, Kentucky, has spent most of his life in Kentucky, chiefly in Harrison County. He was a banker before taking up the real estate business.

Mr. Kimbrough was born in Cynthiana April 1, 1871, a son of W. W. and Johanna C. (Ridgeley) Kimbrough). His mother was born in Jessamine County, Kentucky and his father in Harrison county. W. W. Kimbrough is well remembered as a prominent lawyer and jurist. He was educated in public schools, in Miami University, Ohio, and after marriage moved to Missouri. Three years later he returned to Kentucky and began the practice of law. Subsequently he was elected to the Circuit Bench and re-elected until his death. He was a Methodist and a Democrat.

Daniel R. Kimbrough was the only child. He grew up in Cynthiana, was educated in public schools and Smith's Classical School. He was one of the prospectors in the early West in the mining district of Cripple Creek, Colorado, was also employed by the Anaconda Smelting Co. After about two years he returned to Kentucky and for six years was Deputy Circuit Court Clerk at Cynthiana. He then was identified with the National Bank of

Cynthiana, otherwise interested in farming.

Sept. 1, 1896 he married Miss Bessie Jameson of Millersburg, Ky., a graduate of Millersburg College. They have three children: Francis, a graduate of High School and the University of Kentucky, now principal of Greendale County High School; Elizabeth in her junior year at the University of Kentucky; W. W., the youngest is connected with Packsrd Grocery Co., Sturgis, Michigan.

KERR'S HISTORY OF KENTUCKY

Vol. V, page 459. William Landon Kimbrough was born Todd County, Kentucky, Dec. 3, 1859, son of Wm. Landon and P. B. (Terry) Kimbrough. He was a leading business man of Guthrie, a representative of Todd Co. in Kentucky Legislature and Mayor of Guthrie.

The Kimbrough family is of Scotch-Irish origin, and was founded in Virginia during Colonial days. Thomas Winston Kimbrough, the grandfather of William L., the younger, was born in Va. 1796 and as a young man came with his bride, Susan Gaines, also born in Va. 1796, to Todd Co. as a pioneer farmer. He passed away at Hadensville, Dec. 25, 1868, his wife having died in 1842.

William Landon Kimbrough the elder was born at Hadensville, near Guthrie, Kentucky Sept. 18, 1824 and as a young man adopted farming as his vocation.

At the time of death was owner of 1,600 acres in Todd County and in Robertson County, Tennessee. In early life a Whig, later supported the Democratic Party. He died at Dawson Springs, Kentucky June 25, 1885. He married Miss P. B. Terry, born August 14, 1831 in Logan, now Todd County, Kentucky and died at Hadensville Sept. 20, 1880. Their children: Lizzie, of Louisville, Kentucky, widow of R. B. Rankins, merchant of hardware; Charles G., a farmer of Robertson Co., Tenn. who died aged 59; Eugenia B. who died at Louisville, Ky. aged 54 years; and W. Landon.

William Landon Kimbrough, the younger, educated in Todd Co., Kentucky and Bethal College, Russellville, Kentucky, was farmer with his father, later in 1912 was postmaster of Guthrie, served four years, then traveled in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Upon his return settled in Guthrie and founded his feed, seed and coal business, the leading enterprise in Todd County. He is Republican, served two terms as magistrate and elected representative in State Legislature 1907-08, again elected Nov. 1919-20, was elected mayor of Guthrie, Ky. Nov. 8, 1921.

Mr. Kimbrough married Oct. 8, 1883 at Allensville, Kentucky to Miss Sallie Yost, daughter of E. A. and Nannie (Custer) Yost, both of whom are deceased.

Mr. Yost was a merchant of Allensville. To Mr. and Mrs. Kimbrough were born: Lizzie, b. July 6, 1885, wife of Hadley Cregor, druggist of El Paso, Texas; Wm Landon, b. March 3, 1887, engaged in feed and seed business,

Tennyson, Indiana; Andrew G., b. Sept 15, 1889, manager Department Store at Loving, New Mexico; Rankins B., b. Sept. 13, 1891, assistant cashier of City National Bank, El Paso, Texas; Keith K., b. Dec. 28, 1893, engaged with father in business; Sallie, b. Sept. 1, 1896, unmarried and residing with her parents; Evelyn, b. Sept. 27, 1898, wife of D. T. Mims, farmer near Guthrie; and Robert, b. Aug 1, 1902, at home, a graduate of St. Mary's (Kentucky) College and a law student at Kentucky State University.

This Kerr's History of Kentucky was published in 1922.

(Note: In the second notation there is one Thomas Winston Kimbrough who m. a Susan Gaines. The Winstons and the Gaines are particularly interesting to several, or all, branches of the Kimbroughs. The Gaines name is used frequently among the early Greene Co., Georgia, Kimbroughs as a given or middle name. The Winston and Gaines families must be connected to the Kimbroughs of Virginia. This should give many of us some leads to work on. chk)

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#### MISSISSIPPI

EXCURSUS - "THE KIMBROUGH FAMILY". FROM THE FILES OF THE LATE ROWELL A. BILLUPS (1899-1960), GREENWOOD, MISSISSIPPI CONT'D.

1. Marmaduke Kimbrough was born ca. 1701 in New Kent Co. (later Hanover Co.) Va., and died in Rowan Co., N. C. in 1769, when his will was probated in that county. He married Mary (\_\_\_\_\_).

The prevalence of the name Marmaduke, in the different branches of the Kimbroughs has made it difficult to determine the exact parentage of Marmaduke Kimbrough who removed to North Carolina, and who is the proven progenitor of the Kimbrough family of Mississippi. A Marmaduke Kimbrough patented land on Chubb Creek in Hanover Co., Va., in 1731, in that part of the county which later became Louisa County (Ref: Malcolm H. Harris, History of Louisa County, Va., p. 371, West Point, Va., 1935). This may be the same Marmaduke Kimbrough, who is first found in North Carolina in 1735. Proof whether he first settled in Rowan County, where he later owned several tracts of land, or whether he first lived around Raleigh is not exactly known. One authority states that he and Buckley Kimbrough, presumably his brother, Philip Mulkey or cousin, Edgecomb Co., N. C. came to the vicinity of Raleigh in 1735. Buckley Kimbrough is named in the will of Philip Mulkey, Dec. 19, 1736. A descendant of Orman Kimbrough, son of Marmaduke Kimbrough, states that "Orman moved with his father and three brothers ca. 1765 from near Raleigh, N. C. to the Yadkin near Huntsville, leaving John, a half-brother, at Raleigh." (Ref: Mrs. Betty Kimbrough Moseley, Kissimmee, Florida).



Marmaduke Kimbrough's plantation, known as "Shallowford" was located on the east side of the Shallow Ford of the Yadkin River near Huntsville, "in sight of the Ford". This is in Yadkin County, which was formed in 1850 from Surry County, which in turn had been cut out of Rowan County in 1770. There was an old cemetery nearby which was known as the Kimbrough grave yard.

WILL OF MARMADUKE KIMBROUGH

"In the Name of God, Amen,

I, Marma Duke Kimbrough of Rowan County in the province of North Carolina, being of health and of perfect sense and memory do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament and do dispose in manner and form following:

I give and bequeath unto my son, John Kimbrough, the lands whereon he now lives, called Uwarry, likewise the following negros, viz: Matt, Dick,

Bob, Reuben, Absalom, Moses, Jane, Lett, Henry, and Lett's child, together with what of my Estate give and bequeath unto my son, Orman Kimbrough, the place whereon I now live, called Shallowford, together with two improvements of land adjoining the aforesaid tract to him, and his heirs forever.

Item - It is my desire that the tract of land purchased by Thomas Bryan, lying on Deep Creek, likewise the tract of land purchased by Thomas Turner, near the Shallow may be sold and the money arising therefrom to be laid out in lands to the best advantage of the discretion of my good friends, my executors, hereafter mentioned, and the lands so purchased to be equally divided amongst the following: My beloved wife, Mary Kimbrough, my son, George Kimbrough, my son Golman, and my daughter Anna Kimbrough, to them and their heirs forever.

Item - It is my desire likewise that the following negroes to wit: Dick, Sam, Caesar, Hannah, Rachel to be equally divided amongst my beloved wife, Mary Kimbrough, my son, George Kimbrough, my son Golman Kimbrough, my son Orman Kimbrough, and my daughter, Anna Kimbrough, by my executors, whenever they shall come of age, to them and their heirs forever

Item - It is my desire likewise and all my just debts to be paid out of the outstanding debts due me and the rest remaining together with the rest of the personal estate to be equally divided amongst my beloved wife, Mary Kimbrough and her children above mentioned. Observed that this now mentioned is not part of legacy to my son, John Kimbrough, which is first mentioned and I do constitute and appoint my beloved friend, Roger Turner, Jr., and Elias Turner my executors of this my last will and testament, revoking all other wills by me made.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal, this twenty second day of October, one thousand seven hundred and sixty-eight.
