Dear Cousins-by-the-dozens:

I have just completed the balance of this issue and it is with a heavy heart that I write this, my last message as Editor--at least for the foreseeable future. Prior commitments and family obligations compel me to all a halt to this particular hobby.

You will recall at the last get-together of the Kimbrough Klan I resigned as Editor but promised to get out the last issue for 1965 and 1966. Due to recurrent bouts with flu during the winter of 1965 and spring of 1966, which created a backlog of other work that had to be done, I was unable to get out the Nov. 1965 issue. Clyde H. Kimbrough came to my rescue, and has served as Editor since that time until this issue. When I "edit" an issue, I also have to do the final typing--or cutting of stencils, as the case may be--not complaining, just explaining the amount of time involved.

One of the time-consuming details in compiling a Quarterly is attempting to decipher handwriting. Even when the writing is fairly good, when one is unfamiliar with it and the branch of the family involved, the interpretation sometimes becomes a "guessing game". Suggestion: If you cannot type or have the material typed, print the names of persons and places. When typing, submit the original or a good, clear carbon copy--typed one side of the page only. I had to "stop short" on Vol. III, No. 3, because Clyde's material was typed on both sides of the paper--this was bad enough on the bond paper but when he apparently gave out of that and used onion skin, typed both sides, I gave up!

Many of the items published in this issue were expected to be in the Nov. 1965 Quarterly. I am sure some of you have thought your material was "lost by the wayside"

when, in actuality, this was being held until publication of "my" issues. I had hoped to complete publication of all data sent me, along with items I had acquired or copied, but found this impossible. Any items in my possession which were sent for publication in the Quarterly will be forwarded to Clyde H. Kimbrough, and I feel confident he will publish them as soon as time and space permit. However, if anyone is wondering about the whereabouts of material, it would not be out of order to write Mr. Kimbrough. If it became unintentionally lost in my "stacks", every effort will be made to place it in the proper hands.

Mrs. Johnson is also resigning as Treasurer. Her husband has not been well for a long time and, although it is now felt the worst is over, she still has little time to give to this project as she continues as Administrator of my husband's 19-bed hospital. My daughter, Claire Howze B. Jackson (Mrs. Floyd E.) has been of invaluable help to us but she, too, works in the bookkeeping department at the hospital; has two small children who require much of her time, and is also presently taking some classes at our State Junior College. We might blame a great deal of our failure to meet deadlines on MEDICARE! It is inconceivable for a layman to comprehend the amount of additional paperwork, to say nothing

ABNER KIMBROUGH - Born May 20, 1836, near Scooba, Mississippi, Died February 14, 1862

of pneumonia while he was in the Army.

ORMON PATTILLO KIMBROUGH - Born May 11, 1841, near Scooba, Mississippi. He never married. He died after nursing his brother. At his death he took his bed and died twenty days later of pneumonia, this was March 6, 1862. He lies in an unmarked grave at Warrenton Springs, Virginia.

GEORGE H. KIMBROUGH, JR. - Born July 10, 1845, married October 6, 1869, died February 23, 1924.

ELIZABETH (BETTY) STEELE KIMBROUGH - Born January 16, 1848, Died January 9, 1912. Married April 25, 1866.

*GEORGE H. KIMBROUGH, JR., MY FATHER, MARRIED ANNA ROBERTS MINNIECE. George was always frail and after the death of his older brothers (only brothers) and upon

the advice of a friend and neighbor, his father hired a substitute in the army for him. Later he joined the militia and saw a little service in this and neighboring counties.

MY MOTHER, ANNA ROBERTS MINNIECE KIMBROUGH, was born December 9, 1846, married October 6, 1869. She was the daughter of John Alexander and Eliza Ann (Jeter) Minniece of Gainesville, Alabama.

THEIR CHILDREN WERE:

ALICE KIMBROUGH, Born October 3, 1870, died October 7, 1872.

*BETTY KIMBROUGH, Born April 3, 1872, Married Thomas Reeves Moseley, son of William Armistead and Eliza Fowler (Mitchel) Moseley of Kissimmee, Florida. Date of marriage was December 19, 1906.

ORMON PATTILLO KIMBROUGH, Born January 24, 1874. Married November 22, 1904.

WALTER MINNIECE KIMBROUGH, Born January 7, 1876, - Never married. Died October 8, 1947. (Death date furnished by Mary Ella K. Vine.)

ANNA ELIZA KIMBROUGH, Born February 11, 1878 - Never Married. Died October 31, 1929. (Name changed from "Elizabeth Ann" to "Anna Eliza" and death date added in accordance with instructions from Mary Ella K. Vine.)

GEORGE ALEXANDER KIMBROUGH, Born November 1, 1879, Died July 7, 1900. Never married.

ESTHER (ESSIE) LOVE KIMBROUGH, Born August 4, 1882, Died April 18, 1906. She never married.

SIDNEY JETER KIMBROUGH, Born July 3, 1885, Died August 17, 1925.

GRAND-CHILDREN:

LAURA RUSSELL KIMBROUGH, Born June 6, 1906.

ELLA MAE KIMBROUGH SHEPHERD, Born June 19, 1908.

MARY ELLA KIMBROUGH VINE, Born September 13, 1917.

WALLACE JETER KIMBROUGH, Born October 30, 1922.

(The last two grandchildren were children of Sidney Jeter Kimbrough who was married

twice and had one child by each wife.)

The following data was enclosed in the same mailing as that shown above; ie., apparently furnished by Betty Kimbrough Moseley and mailed by her niece, Mrs. Vine. An effort has been made by your editor (of this issue) to analyze this material to determine the author but without success. It is of the Goldman Kimbrough line and I am so naming it. (See "Editorial Comment" on page 5.)

LINE OF GOLDMAN KIMBROUGH

From what I can learn of the Kimbroughs, two brothers came from Wales, one settling in the South and West, the other in the North and East. One siding with the Colonist, the other with the Crown.

Our Kimbrough ancestors had five sons. I find the following data among old papers:

James Kimbrough formerly of North Carolina, son of John Kimbrough: who had half brothers by the name of George, Ormon, Goldman and Marmaduke. James Kimbrough of Marengo County, Alabama first wife was Susie, who left a little baby; second wife was Annie Boatner.

We are of Welch extraction and have the same traditions as to the origin of the family in America as you have. My grandfather, Richard Calvin Kimbrough was born in North Carolina. His grandfather, Goldman Kimbrough was born in Virginia and later moved to North Carolina and then to Alabama. Doctor M. B. Kimbrough my great-grandfather moved from near Raleigh, North Carolina and settled on the Yadkin at Huntsville, Surry County (now Yadkin County) about 1765 to 1770. He had four sons, Ormon, Marmaduke, Goldman and George that came with him. He left near Raleigh a son John (for whom my father was named). He at the time being grown and had a family. About the end of that Century he moved West, I think to Georgia.

Ormon married Miss Millie Pattillo of Virginia. I always heard my farther speak of her as Aunt Millie and she had a sister who married a Poindexter, who was the grandmother of one U. S. Senator and General in the Confederate Army. General T. L. Clingman, who was a neighbor of ours. My great uncle Ormon died about 1820 or probably previous thereto, and Aunt Millie sold out to Colonel Puryear, who married a sister of General Clingman and left her about 1830. From this and data I have gathered the following short history of this branch of the Kimbrough family.

Mildred Pattillo daughter of Rev. Henry Pattillo and Mary Anderson Pattillo. Samuel Davies (an ancestor of Jefferson Davis) on one of his evangelistic trips

met Henry Pattillo at the Staunton River. A casual reader would be impressed with the influence Davies influenced on young men but he never touched a more blessedly useful man than Henry Pattillo. He was Davies junior by three years and was now a schoolmaster of twenty-five. Born in Scotland (1726), brought to Virginia a lad of nine years (1735), he kept books for a time, then taught school. John Thomson discovered Pattillo in North Carolina, probably at or near Mooresville and encouraged him to study for the ministry, suggesting that he go to Pennsylvania to study theology. Pattillo started but was stricken by serious illness. At the psychological moment he came under the magnetic spell of Samuel Davies and returned with him about August 1, 1751 to Hanover. For two years he was a member of Mr. Davies' household. When Davies returned from Europe (1755) Pattillo resumed his studies. He was very poor, but not too poor to marry. The object of his affection was Mary Anderson, a Virginia maid. Davies insisted they wait until he finished his education, but they were entirely unwilling to take such conservative advice. It was a hard pull for bride and groom, but he was a Scotchman and they got through. Hanover Presbyterian licensed him September 28, 1757 and ordained him July 12, 1758 and placed a call for three of Davies' churches in his hands, Bird in Goochland, Buck Island in Albemarle and Willis Creek in (the present) Buckingham. He remained four years. One of the first honorary degrees bestowed by the new college of Hampden Sidney was an A. M. given Pattillo in 1787. This honor was worthily worn for he was a real thinker, an influential teacher and an author of some repute. His sermons were published in 1787 and he brought out an edition of Leland's "Deistical Writers". He prepared a geography, a catechism and

several essays (never published). Henry Pattillo became conspicuous as a patriot. Sat in the Provincial Congress of North Carolina (1775) was Chaplain of that body, and chairman of the committee of the whole. Was a delegate from Halifax District as "District Committee of Safety 1775 (3). He died on a preaching tour of many miles to Dinwiddle County, Virginia, tho the condition of his health was precarious, far advanced in his seventy-fifth year, having spent forty five years of his life in the arduous labour of preaching the gospel. His funeral sermon was preached by Prury Lacy to his congregations in Granville County, North Carolina on October 11, 1801. This sermon was afterwards printed (June 28, 1802) by Doctor Lacy for the widow, Mrs. Mary Pattillo, at her request. The Pattillo's had other children besides Mildred: Two, James Anderson, who possibly moved to Arkansas, James had a daughter Fanny Anne; and Jane, who first married a Lanier and had a son and daughter, the son was engaged to a Miss Young; the daughter to Marmaduke Kimbrough. Both died. A Colonel Williams suggested to "Uncle Marmaduke" to go to see Miss Young, which he did and they fixed matters up and were married. After the death of Mr. Lanier, Jane md Frank Poindexter and they had Andrew who possibly moved to Arkansas. Nancy and Jane and Tom, who never married. Nancy married Frank Clingman, Jane, Jacob Clingman. Each had three children. Nancy and Jacob died; then Jane and Frank lived together and raised their six children. One of these children was the U. S. Senator and General in the Confederate Army. T. L. Clingman and Andrew Clingman lived in Arkansas (August 1, 1867). He lost three sons during the War Between the States, and another shot thru the thigh. He had eight sons and four daughters, losing three in infancy.

* * * * *

EDITORIAL COMMENT. It seems likely that the author of the foregoing material was a first cousin of E. R. E. Kimbrough whose letters were published in Vol. III, No. 2. both claim Richard C. Kimbrough as grandfather but it should be noted that one states Goldman Kimbrough was his gr-grandfather while the other claims him as his gr-gr-grandfather...It is to be regretted that some of the material has not

been published
sooner but, at times, there wasn't space and, many times, follow-up
correspondence was
needed to properly edit and clarify data. Much of the foregoing is
beautifully
phrased; portions of it are so punctuated or lack necessary punctuation
to readily
understand some of the relationships. Due to Mrs. Moseley's age, it did
not seem
probable that she could add much to her material. It is regretted that
Mrs. Moseley
died before this issue was published, but lineage has been included in
"Excursus, The
Kimbrough Family", from the files of the late Rowell A. Billups of
Greenwood, Miss.,
to which she was a contributor....It has not been the policy of your
editors to
include material on other than those of the immediate Kimbrough family
but an
exception was made in this case because of the apparent interest in the
Rev. Henry
Pattillo (Pattilo). Mrs. Murray L. Crosse, 6431 Bryn Mawr, N. E.,
Albuquerque, New
Mexico 87106, is collecting data on the Pattillo family. She hopes to
have an
original book on the family reprinted and add a supplement of material
which she is
gathering.

BENJAMIN KIMBROUGH: CLARK COUNTY RESIDENT. (Garette State News Service)

Arkadelphia, August 14, 1962...Benjamin Kimbrough, aged 93, of Hollywood (Clark County) Ark., died Monday at a Little Rock Hospital. He was born in Coosie County, Ala. and moved to Hollywood, Ark. in 1871, where he was in the mercantile business for many years. He was a member of the Hollywood Baptist Church. Survivors include his wife Fannie Little Kimbrough, two sons Leonard of Arlington, Texas and Donovan K. of Fairborn, O., two daughters Mrs. Birva Blackwell of St. Louis, Mo. and Mrs. Oresta Hill of Prescott, Ark.; a sister Mrs. E. A. Thomas of Texarkana and nine grandchildren, several great-grandchildren. Funeral will be at 10 a.m. Wednesday at the Murry Funeral Chapel by Rev. Stanley Cooper. Burial will be at Rose Hill Cemetery.

Comments: Benjamin J. Kimbrough was a brother of Thomas H. Kimbrough (sons of Zack Powell Kimbrough as listed on preceding page) and above item was sent to Mrs. A. S. Kimbrough by the grandson of Thomas H. Kimbrough.

Mrs. Kimbrough has corresponded with Mrs. E. A. Thomas, listed as a sister of Benjamin Kimbrough in the preceding obituary, and states that "After reading this and the poem - and Coosa County mentioned in both places - followed the lead that started me in the right direction!"

C., which contains an article by Mary Hilliard Hinton entitled "Colonel John Hinton". This is a reprint of a paper published in The South Atlantic Quarterly, Vol. 1, No. 2, and was reproduced in The Booklet since it was impossible to supply orders for copies of the magazine containing this article as the early numbers were destroyed by fire....."Colonel Hinton lived but a short while to enjoy the liberty he had fought for and aided in winning for the States. He passed away in the spring of 1784. His remains were interred near his home in the family burying-ground. He married Grizelle Kimbrough, who was born about 1720, daughter of Buckley and sister of Nathaniel Kimbrough. Eight children survived him."...His will, which is recorded in the courthouse at Raleigh, is given in full and mentions his wife Grizeal Hinton and, among others, "Daughter Elizabeth James, wife of Thomas James." "Azle is a small community on the Parker and Tarrant County line. Have
been told that
the above O. L. Kimbrough and James were cousins but I do not have proof
of
relationship.

"I called the granddaughter of O. L. Kimbrough and she said his name was
Ormand Lenier
Kimbrough and he was born in Mississippi. His wife Annie was Annie
Hamilton
Tannahill, and she was born Fulton, Miss. The granddaughter (Miss Myrtle
Kimbrough)
said she thought both of them came from Fulton, Miss. Miss Myrtle said
the above
Mattie (of the census) was still living but in poor health.

"Miss Myrtle Kimbrough also has a brother, Ormond Lenier Kimbrough,
living at Azle on
the old home place....The Tannahills were prominent people. They had the
Stagecoach
Inn or stop and part of the Tannahill house still stands - the original
fireplace is
still there. This place was featured in the newspaper a few years ago.
I believe
this was the Butterfield stage route to California and New Mexico.

"I can't place this W. A. born Tenn. He was probably another son or
brother of James
Kimbrough (perhaps a brother to the above Ormond Lanier." (Reference
here is to O. L.
Kimbrough listed in 1880 census and W. A. Kimbrough of same census.)

Mrs. Baker states she wrote to Mr. Taylor of Midland, Texas (see earlier

MORE ABOUT THE EARLIER MEMBERS OF THE KIMBROUGH FAMILY --
JOHN KIMBROUGH, SR. (COLONIST), BUCKLEY, NATHANIEL, etc., with
comments on
MARMADUKE.

The following letter, dated 18 Oct. 1965, was written by Jonathan Smith,
1912 Vinton
Ave., Memphis, Tenn., 38104:

My dear Mrs. Bryant,

I have so enjoyed these marvels of Kimbrough genealogy, thru the "Quarterly" issues. I have had an intimate interest in this family for many years, as I am a descendant of Nathaniel Kimbrough of Lick Creek Plantation in eastern Wake Co., N. C.

I am bothered by a certain persistency in the quarterlies and I wish to elaborate. It is stated, over and again, that Nathaniel Kimbrough is a son of a certain Marmaduke Kimbrough. What disturbs me most of all is that this assertion is repeated time and again, as hazy information. I have never found a public record of any Marmaduke, son of John Sr. Perhaps there was such, but surely he didn't sink out of sight in that

freshet of years past.

We have long assumed, with evidence of course, that our Nathaniel (1781) was one of the sons of Bulkley Kimbrough, son of John Kimbrough, Sr. Bulkley Kimbrough was born 1699, died 1743. My Nathaniel Kimbrough had a son, John born 1765; a daughter, Mary (Polly) Kimbrough, married to John Martin (my ancestors) was young and unmarried, as was sister Penny, in 1781. Nathaniel Kimbrough's wife, Mary Alston, was born 1730 or thereabouts; surely her husband was not old enough to be her father. Bulkley Kimbrough, was just of the age to have son, Nathaniel Kimbrough, born 1720-30.

Nathaniel Kimbrough had as executor, John Kimbrough, his "brother". Bulkley's two listed sons were Nathaniel and John.

Your splendid coverage, by Adm. Kimbrough, so ably delineates the facts of Marmaduke in Va. and N. C. and no where do we find this legendary Marmaduke, son of John, Sr.--
Legendary in the sense that any such John and Margaret's son died circa 1768 in Surry Co., N. C., as demonstrated in the above article.

And, I find no records implying Nathaniel Kimbrough was a brother of Marmaduke Kimbrough. The latter given name is not even prominent in our branch(es). In fact, Nathaniel's son, John (1765-1822), had a son (his eldest) named Buckley, born in North Carolina, 1800.

The evidence stands so "tall" and it's only fair that another side be equally stressed. The contributor knew more about Buckley than is intimated, by his assigning John and Nathaniel to him. And that list of reputed Marmaduke Kimbrough's children needs some documentation, for instance, on the Benton lineage (Senator Benton's line).

John Martin (d. 8 April 1833) m. Mary Kimbrough, dau. of Nathaniel Kimbrough's dau. I know. Frances Alston Martin (1799-1862) m. Samuel Harrison Smith (1795-1873), 1824, my ancestors. (2) Sarah Kimbrough Martin (1804-1882) m. 1828 Gen'l. N. G. Smith. A distinguished family. (3) Mary Ann Martin (1812-1893) m. Judge Willis Lewis Somervell (1811-1864), 1834. Their gr-grandson is presently a Justice on the Ark. State Supreme Court.

Mary K. Martin d. 1812 and John Martin m. (2) Susannah Robeteau, 1814.

I'm still in hopes of determining a bit closer the date Nathaniel Kimbrough died in Wake.

Letter dated 29 October 1965 by Laurence B. Gardiner, 1863 Cowden Ave., Memphis, Tenn.
38104:

Dear Mrs. Bryant,

I have just been reading and enjoying the issues of Kimbrough Quarterly loaned me by a friend, J. K. Smith of Memphis, who recently secured a full set of them.

I am not a Kimbrough descendant, but many of my kin folks are, and being very much interested in genealogy, I have done some work on the Kimbroughs and know a little about the family.

I am particularly interested in the descendants of LEWIS MOORE who moved from Wake Co., N. C., about 1810 to Rutherford Co., Tenn., then about 1820 on to Shelby Co., Memphis, Tenn. Lewis Moore died here about 1828 and his wife Charity (known by his descendants to have been Charity Kimbrough) in 1835. From the wills of both of them and other sources we know that at least they had the following children:

1. John Kimbrough Moore who had remained in North Carolina.
2. Mary, b. 22 Oct. 1784, m. James Warren in Wake County.
3. Betsy, the wife of _____ Shipp, living N. C. 1835, later here
4. Grizel (Gilly), m. Joseph Locke in Rutherford County. (My great uncle)
5. Penny, the wife of _____ Thompson, a widow in 1835.
6. Nathaniel Moore married Mrs. Julia C. (Adams) Adams (my gr-grandmother).
7. William Alston Moore married Anne Maria Adams, sister of the above.

Lewis Moore is mentioned as a son-in-law in the will of Nathaniel Kimbrough, and he also mentions his daughter ANN MOORE, but does not say that Lewis Moore is her husband. It is my opinion that both his daughters Ann and Charity married Moores, but the records here definitely show that the wife of Lewis Moore was Charity and that the above are their children and, from the given names of the Moore children, I think there could be slight doubt that their Mother was the daughter of Nathaniel Kimbrough of Wake County; and we have assumed this to be true. Nathaniel Kimbrough's children are given from his will on page 13 of your Jan. 1965 issue as I remember them in the will when I saw it in Wake County except I don't remember any daughter of Charity being mentioned. On page 19 of the same volume, it shows that Charity, the daughter of Nathaniel, married Col. Ransome Sutherland of Va. I believe this is in error, but if we are in error about Charity (Kimbrough) Moore who died in Shelby County and left will probated 1835, we do want to know it. On page 13 of your Jan. 1964 Quarterly, you will find listed the marriage in Wake County of "Moore, Richard from Caswell County to Kimbrough, Nancy - 1778." This I suppose to be the Ann Moore mentioned in the will of Nathaniel Kimbrough, thus she was not the wife of Lewis Moore.

There are many Kimbroughs in Shelby County, the brothers and nephews of Charity Moore, came here with the Moores, the names Nathaniel and Buckley are frequently used in the family. My great aunt, Julia, married Mr. Buckley Kimbrough who was a prominent lawyer here.

It is presently my studied opinion that the Nathaniel Kimbrough from whom the Shelby

County, Tenn., Kimbroughs and Moores come (and, as I said earlier, I judge him to be the same as the Nathaniel of Wake County who married Mary Alston, from the use of Alston given names in their descendants) to have been the son Nathaniel, identified in the records of Edgecombe County, N. C. (as shown on page 3 of your Jan. 1965 issue) as the son of Buckley Kimbrough who died in Edgecombe in 1743. All the other articles in the Quarterly attempt to identify Nathaniel as a son of his uncle Marmaduke Kimbrough, where there is no documentary evidence that I have seen that he had a son Nathaniel.

I will be most happy to cooperate in any way with anyone interested to attempt to work out this apparent mix-up in the Kimbroughs of this branch.

12 July 1781; probated Dec. term of court, 1781 - Lists (as only in will):

Mary, wife; daughters: Elizabeth Warren, Ann Moore, Charity, Gilley, Penny, Polly and

Sally. Granddaughter Sarah Kimbrough, daughter of Charity Kimbrough; sons: John and

James to inherit "all my lands to be equally divided between them when they come of

age or marry". Executors: his brother John Kimbrough (so designated in will), his

own son, John; Henry Warren, John Hinton, Jr. and Thomas Hines.

This is the abstract we would like to see published, for it is what is only in the

will without surmises.

As to Nathaniel Kimbrough's origin: Buckley Kimbrough of Hanover, b. Nov. 1699; he

disappears from Hanover and appears in Edgecombe Co., N. C. in 1735. There he died in

1743. (Edgecombe Co. Deed rec. 3, p. 309 - direct quotation - John Kimbrough son and

heir-at-law of Buckley Kimbrough late of Edgecombe Co. to Nathaniel Kimbrough, another

of said Buckley's sons.)

In June 1755, Nathaniel Kimbrough purchased 300 acres of land in Orange County from

Samuel Benton; he sold land in an area that became Wake County in 1760. (Johnston

Co.: Bk. A-1, p. 180). He early moved to that part of Orange County that became, after

1771, Wake County. (Lick Creek plantation)

Until proof to the contrary can be mustered, Nathaniel Kimbrough and his brother, John

Kimbrough, stand as sons of Buckley Kimbrough of Hanover. Marmaduke Kimbrough's

progeny has been well defined and excludes any father-son relationship as re:

Nathaniel and John Kimbrough.

Charity Kimbrough did not marry Ransom Sutherland. I refer you to Hicks' new History

of Granville Co., Vol. I, 1965, Mar. Bond No. 8: Charity Alston to Ransom Sutherland,

5 April 1778. Hence the confusion with Charity Kimbrough who was married to Lewis

Moore and they removed to Shelby Co., Tenn.

It was also reputed that Ann Kimbrough wed Lewis Moore. From marriage bonds, Ann

Kimbrough to Richard Moore, 1778.

We hope this will help numerous of our kin. There is more, but a little bit for now.

Editorial Comment: The above write-up was the most difficult one I have published.

Volee Kimbrough Watkins (Mrs. Nathan F.) was, in addition to being my second cousin, one of the finest women I have ever known. Her misfortunes, which were many - orphaned at about age three, both parents dying within three days, she was reared by her father's brother and his family (my paternal grandparents); her only sister died while they were still children; her only brother, at about 30-32, was accidentally killed when he fell from a bridge while doing construction work; her youngest son, a victim of encephalitis, died at about age fifteen after many years of constant care - seemed only to have refined and deepened her character and capacity to love her family and friends.

Offsetting the sorrows in her life were many blessings: a devoted husband who has been a successful businessman for many years, two fine sons and a lovely daughter. All three children are college graduates, married and have children.

Volee was fatally injured one week prior to her death, victim of automobile accident in which her husband was painfully, although not critically, injured. They were unable to avoid collision with a truck, the driver of which was in a drunken state.

My sister, Berta (Mrs. W. H.) Johnson, and I visited with the family while Volee and Nathan were patients in the hospital and, later, attended her funeral. In spite of the sadness of the occasion, the importance of keeping family genealogical

data was unusually apparent. Since Volee's children had never known their maternal grandparents, they were not certain about some details. For their sakes, and that of their descendants, listed below are items obtained since publication of Vol. I, No. 4.

(An idea which has recently occurred to me and which I think would be a good suggestion for all: Place with your burial insurance policy a statement containing

you have served in Armed Forces, list war and/or dates; your Social Security Number.

This information is requested on a death certificate and, in case of accident, more

than one member of a family could be killed and a family "connection", friend, or even

a stranger might be requested to give this information.)

The Marriage Bond and Consent to the Marriage of a Minor are both blank.

Note: Tombstone shows Leila A. and marriage records consistently show Lela. Request for license was made by an F. L. Sellers. Tombstone was probably placed by her brother-in-law John Kimbrough who, with his wife Victoria Jane DeWitt, reared the orphaned children, as her husband predeceased her.

Clarke County Census Records for 1890 should show a Lela or Leila in the home of an Irvin, Irwin or possibly Ervin, Erwin. She would have been about age 7

at that time.

Woods Bluff, the place of marriage, offers a clue. This Census should be available at most libraries.

Choctaw Corner Cemetery .. sometimes noted as Choctaw Corner, Ala., or Choctaw Corner Cemetery, Thomasville, Ala. .. Of probable interest to the Clarke Co. branch of the family, the editor has a copy of an early map of Alabama which shows a Choctaw Corner in approximately the present site of Thomasville, although there is no "town" at Choctaw Corner now, it predates the town of Thomasville. This was in the era when there was no Birmingham but an "Elyton".
