Dear Cousins-by-the-dozens:

Late again. This should come to you as a Christmas present. Any time before

Christmas will be just that much earlier that I was able to get the work done. It is

hoped that I might get it done in November but chances are that I will be up in the

month of December. When this is finished plans will be to go forth to get out the

first issue for 1968 in near schedule time.

I am at least overcoming some of the delay.

Let me say that I am getting in some fine data. I am getting other data that could be

made more complete before publication. I hope to provide some guidelines for

preparing your data for publication. Just remember it should be as complete as

possible so that it will provide future genealogists the leads necessary to prove the

data after a hundred years or more has passed without difficulty. Also remember that

courthouses and records still bet burned up often. This is also true of family

records such as bible records, and old family letters, news clippings etc. People

just get tired of moving and storing them. In my particular branch of the family one

of my father's brothers had kept many of the old family pictures and moved them from

place to place until he became weary of moving, hanging, and protecting them so he

just had a bonfire and burned them. That has been the story for so many wonderful

items that would provide some wonderful genealogy finds.

The Kimbro-Kimbrough Genealogical Association met here in Auburn Saturday October 28,

1967 and elected a new slate of officers for 1968-69. I hope you will back them up in

every way possible by supporting the Association and help get new members and renewals

wherever you can. They are appointing State Directors to assist with the work of the

Association and hope that if you are not appointed now you will work with the one

accepting the appointment in your state or area. Where we have but few members over

an area of several states chances are we will use the area Director approach. They

will work toward getting a good mailing list with basic genealogical data

on as many
Kimbro-Kimbroughs as they can in your state with your self. They will
work to help
get data in shape for publication in the quarterly. This will reduce the
work of the
editor as much material has to be reworked. We owe it to every member of
every branch
of the family to get the data complete and correct as possible before
publication.

you. We are
ready now to make some expansion in this fine organization. With your

enlarge our publication. I believe we can do it with out increasing
membership dues
but it will take more members and better prepared material. We hope to
double our
membership during the year. I believe it can be done in 1968. There are
still many
who know very little or nothing about what we are trying to do. Just let
them know
and inform them how they can help in promoting our work.
Help us to know every member of this great family that has scattered over
this wide-
wide world. Let us track them down and get their stories.

You have already a fair rundown on the newly elected treasurer and
editor. I am

descended from the Wm. KIMBROUGH, Sr. of Georgia. This is the same line
as that of
the husband of the Vice President Mrs. Thomas S. KIMBROUGH. I hope some
time during
the coming year to complete my line which was ended temporarily in Vol.
III, No. 3.

In addition to the new officers noted above it was decided to appoint
also some

Directors to serve in states where there are large numbers of member families and in areas of several states where member families are scattered. It was the feeling at our meeting that this would give us a broader base; provide us a chance to get out genealogy data prepared in better form for publishing; and in the end make it possible to enlarge the quarterly and at the same time keep the price of membership down. With the cost of postage going up we will not know just what effect this will have on us. The officers of the Association feel that they will be able to get closer to the family through these directors. The director will be there for you to use to help you with your genealogy whenever then can. Often they will be

calling on you to assist them with this family genealogy and in trying to improve the Association.

Each director is encourage to work with other members of the Association to try to form state or area Associations to work with and help promote the national Association.

Each director is encouraged to work with other members toward increasing the membership of the national Association so that we will be able to broaden our program.

Each director will assist any person with genealogy relating to the Kimbro-Kimbrough family. They will make every effort to get the material properly prepared to be published in the quarterly.

We would like for the directors to take on the job of indexing our first twelve quarterlies. We would ask that you who can get a working force to start on one

quarterly to contact the editor and he will assign you an issue that has not already

been taken. As soon as they are finished they will be sent in to the editor for

publication and will be provided the membership at a reasonable cost. Used computer

cards make wonderful indexing cards and can be had usually for the asking. Anyone

having access to a source would do the Association to arrange for several thousand.

If they are mailed to the editor I'll see that they are provided the directors who

will help with the indexing. If any member other than the directors wishes to assist

in indexing let the editor know or your director if you have one appointed in your

state or area.

The director idea is a new one with us. After some work with the directors we are

sure that many of you serving in that capacity will be able to make recommendations to

strengthen the position. We would appreciate you relaying that information to the

president.

It will not be in good taste for the director to harbor information sent in to them

that was prepared for the Association. We would recommend that when the material is

checked and in order for publication that it be returned to the individual originating

it and let them send it in to the editor (Archives). The headquarters here in Auburn

will maintain the Archives, under the supervision of the editor. The

editor has informed his wife that in the event of death that all the Association papers be filed in the Kimbro-Kimbrough file in the Archives library in Montgomery available for all to research. The appointment as director will cover the same period as the officers, two years. Some appointments have already been made and accepted. Others will be asked to serve. The list of appointments will be listed with addresses in the 1st issue for 1968. If anyone appointed as director finds for some reason he cannot continue to serve please let it be known. Your recommendations for an appointment in you state or area will be appreciated. If when the list is printed you find you do not have a director assigned to your state or area please let us know if you will serve and we will be glad to appoint you to serve. The directors are advised to us 8" x 11" good grade light weight paper for correspondence so as to make for easy filing. In all correspondence the director is advised to use onion skin and carbon and make a copy of correspondence for their records. Two extra carbons with one copy going to the secretary of the Association. This copy to secretary can be accumulated with other copies and will reduce cost of postage. The Association will refund on reasonable bills sent in for expenditures for paper, carbon paper, envelopes, stamps not to exceed \$12.00. These bills and expenditures must be properly

certified that they have been used for the promotion of the Association. They will be sent to the treasurer for payment. This \$12.00 represents three member's dues for one year and it is expected that each director will certainly account for more than three new members for each year to counter-balance this expenditure. The final piece of work which we wish to accomplish with the directors is preparing INDIVIDUAL DATA SHEET (SHEETS) for every member of the Kimbro-Kimbrough family. It needs to be made out in a minimum of two copies, one going to the editor for the Archives, the other to the director for his files. The person preparing the sheet should also keep a copy. A sample form will follow which will be considered satisfactory unless you have suggestions sent in immediately for change. We want to identify the individual by his full name as known and the state of his birth if known. This will come at the upper left hand corner, and will be an aid to filing. After an accumulation it will be a worthwhile project to publish and make available to all a biographical sketch on every name put in the file. By following the use of the standard form and standard size sheet we could have it off-set copied and printed. The back of the sheet and as many attached sheets as needed will complete the biography on the individual.

Note: We are very grateful to Miss Jenks KIMBROUGH for providing the following data on the Alexander KIMBROUGH line. It is hoped that we can tie Alexander KIMBROUGH to the North Carolina or Virginia KIMBROUGHS in time. It would appear from the name Bradley in the family that he might be a grandson of the Rev. Duke KIMBROUGH through one of his older sons from his second wife Susan HUNTER. See VOL. IV, No. 3, page 3, there are four sons listed as born to this marriage. If anyone has the answer, please send it in.

I have data in my files on both George Bradley KIMBRO (KIMBROUGH) and Thomas Benjamin KIMBROUGH that will be published as a continuation. See Vol. II, No. 2, pages 19-20 for some census in Bedford Co., Tennessee. These census records are for 1860-1870, earlier census records might show an Alexander KIMBROUGH (KIMBRO) listed at approximately the correct age. You will note that the census records have the name recorded KIMBRO. The editor.

KIMBROUGH FAMILY IN ANNUAL REUNION

The third annual reunion of the descendants of William KIMBROUGH, member of one of the

distinguished pioneer families of Virginia, the mother state, was held at the home of

Mrs. Lizzie Kimbrough CLAY --- the oldest descendant --- at Clay's Cross

Roads

yesterday, when more than one hundred guests, most of whom were descendants, gathered for a spend-the-day, typical of ye olden days when families and friends were wont to gather together at frequent intervals.

William KIMBROUGH, the paternal ancestor of this company, was born in Louisa County, Virginia, in 1767, the son of Samuel KIMBROUGH, a native of England. (In 1967 we know this is not true about Samuel being a native of England. The editor), who was brought to Maryland at an early day and with his family emigrated to Kentucky in 1783. William KIMBROUGH was twice married. His first wife Elizabeth JAMESON, of Cane Ridge in Bourbon County, was the mother of John

Montgomery KIMBROUGH, who married Susan JONES, and these were the parents of Mrs.

Lizzie CLAY; of the late Judge William KIMBROUGH of Cynthiana (father of Dan R.

KIMBROUGH), and of the late Mrs. Nannie LEBUS, of Cynthiana, mother of Frank Louis and

Linus LEBUS, who with their families were present.

William KIMBROUGH'S second wife, Elizabeth WALTON, was born in 1778 near Baltimore,

Maryland. Of this union six children were born, only one of whom, Mary (Mrs. Frank

CURLE, of Cynthiana), survives. This branch of the family was represented by many of

the younger generation.

The setting for the reunion was typical of the spirit of the day. The Clay home,

known as "Rose Dale", is one of the oldest in the South, as was originally a tavern,

known as Johnson's Inn. It is a rambling structure, beautiful in its quiet

simplicity, with a spacious living room from which genuine hospitality has ever been

dispensed.

The place was acquired by Joseph Helm CLAY in 1832 and much of the present furnishing

he had milled at Centerville at that time. There is a genuineness about the

atmosphere of this home which seems to breathe a welcome to all who enter there.

At 12:30 o'clock dinner was announced and it may truly be said that the tables fairly

groaned with good things to eat.

Seated at the table of honor were the venerable mother of the home, Mrs. Lizzie

CLAY, who on September 3, will be eighty-nine years of age; Mrs. Mary CURLE, of

Cynthiana, who was a bridesmaid at the CLAY wedding; Mrs. Sue TALBOTT, of Cynthiana;

Mrs. Fannie KIMBROUGH, of Georgetown; Mrs. Hulda KIMBROUGH, of Cynthiana; Mrs. Gatesby

WOODFORD; Mrs. W. B. ARDERY; Mr. John T. KIMBROUGH, of Owingsville; Mr. Thomas JONES,

of Nicholas County; and Mr. James MCCLURE.

KIMBROUGH FAMILY REUNION AT ROSEDALE

"Rosedale", the quaint old home of Mrs. Lizzie Kimbrough CLAY, at Clay's
Cross Roads,
was the scene on Thursday of the fourth annual reunion of the descendants
of one
Samuel KIMBROUGH, Revolutionary soldier whose record is one of honor and
distinction.

The first Filson Map of Kentucky, designates this place - then known as "Johnson's Inn" as located on Cooper's Run. In 1832, Capt. JOHNSON, the owner, sold "Johnson's Inn" and adjacent land, to Henry CLAY, Sr., for his son Joseph Helm CLAY, the father of Samuel Scott CLAY, late husband of Mrs. Lizzie Kimbrough CLAY. Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Scott CLAY began their married life at "Johnson's Inn", now known as "Rosedale", and except for the addition of modern conveniences, very few changes have been made in the original house.

For years it has been the fond hope of many of the descendants that a permanent organization might be effected and a concerted effort made to collect family records and to instill in the hearts of the younger generation a spirit of honor and pride with the hope that the name will go down in history unblemished by word or deed. Near 150 descendants of their distinguished ancestor, Samuel KIMBROUGH, came from far and near, to renew acquaintances and strengthen the tie of love which blood alone can prompt.

During the day plans for a permanent organization were completed and the following officers elected: Mr. John T. KIMBROUGH, of Owingsville, president; Mr. Dan R. KIMBROUGH, of Cynthiana, secretary. A Committee was also appointed to arrange for the next annual meeting.

The place of honor was accorded the sainted mother of the home, Mrs. Lizzie Kimbrough CLAY, who on September 3, will celebrate her 90th birthday. An unusual record, yet time has dealt gently with this delightful bit of womanhood, the furrows of age have but emphasized the charm of her gentle nature, and in nearing the end of life's journey she sees the transition as merely the lifting of the veil when there will be a happy reunion of loved ones who have gone before. Her children and grandchildren are all living and were present for the reunion.

The day was unusual for midsummer, delightfully cool with plenty of sunshine and a spirit of good cheer reigning everywhere.

At 12:30 o'clock, the guests were invited to dinner and all seated at long tables arranged in the two spacious rooms. Pink gladioli were attractively arranged on each of the tables, which fairly groaned with good things to eat. After

dinner this one
big family of near 150 present, gathered on the veranda and lawn, and
with attorney
John J. WILLIAMS presiding, genuine appreciation was expressed for the
delightful
hospitality and letters and telegrams read, including a letter of
greeting from Miss
Nannie ROBERTS, of Washington, D. C., with regrets that she could not be
present, and
a telegram from Lawrence WILLIAMS, from Williams, New Mexico, a first
cousin of the
speaker.

Mr. Williams then introduced Mrs. William Breckenridge ARDERY (Julia
SPENCER), who
read an interesting and comprehensive paper on "The KIMBROUGHS" which
upon special
request, we have been granted the privilege of publishing in full:
THE KIMBROUGHS
John KIMBROUGH, who came to Virginia, presumably from Scotland, is the
earliest known
ancestor of the KIMBROUGH family in America. He was a resident of New
Kent County,
Virginia, in the year 1687, when he patented land in that county. It is
thought he
was twice married, the name of his first wife being unknown. His second
marriage was
with Margaret NATIN, about or prior to 1698, as his son by this marriage,
Buckley
KIMBROUGH, was baptized in St. Peter's Episcopal Church the following
year.

I might say here that in the study of genealogy one often meets with baffling problems, and when the records are meager, or lost, the quest becomes all the more fascinating because of such difficulties. Certainly, this is true in regard to the KIMBROUGH family. Practically all of the court records in the first two counties in which this family lived have been destroyed. As I before stated, we first find the family living in New Kent, where nothing is preserved except the Parish Registers, and it is from a photostat of the original Register of St. Peter's Church, now preserved in the Virginia State Library, that the following entries have been taken.

Rebecka, daughter of John KIMBOROW, Jr., born ye 10th Aug. John KIMBOROW, son of John KIMBOROW, bap. 21st Dec. 1701. Buckley, son of John KIMBRIELL, Sr. by Margaret NATIN, born Nov. 1699. Major, son of John KIMBOROW, bap. 3rd June 1708. Mary, daughter of John KIMBOROW, Jr. born ye 30th Jan. 1704.

The family above referred to lived in that part of New Kent County which later became Hanover County, due to the fact that on November 12, 1720, New Kent requested that their upper Parish of St. Paul be made a county. This was agreed to and on the 23rd of December, 1720, Governor SPOTTSWOOD approved the bill and Hanover County was formed from New Kent. In this new county of Hanover we next look for information concerning the KIMBROUGH family, we find all of the records destroyed except the old books preserved in the Virginia State Library. From these books, however, we find a few additional records in the early tax lists. Continuing the study of the genealogy of counties, as well as that of the KIMBROUGH family, in the year 1742, Louisa County was cut from Hanover, and it is in this county that we find the name of KIMBROUGH upon the old and worn record books in the office of the County Clerk. About the year 1735 we find the family dividing, one branch going into North Carolina, where at least five of the name are recorded as having rendered service during the Revolutionary War. A little later some members of this branch moved to Mississippi, and among their descendants were C. M. KIMBROUGH, of Glenwood, chancellor of Mississippi; another was President of the University of Mississippi, while three of

the name were judges of the courts of that State.
Outside of all this, we feel sure your interest for the most part is concentrated on those KIMBROUGHs who remained in Virginia, since the immigrant to Kentucky came directly from that state.
In Perrin's history of Bourbon, Harrison and Nicholas Counties in a biographical sketch of one of the Kentucky KIMBROUGHs it is stated that his ancestor, Samuel KIMBROUGH, a native of England came to America, settling first in Maryland, later moving to Louisa County, Virginia, where his son, William, was born in the year 1767; about the year 1783 this KIMBROUGH accompanied his son William to Nicholas County, where he died.
It is probable that a part of this tradition is incorrect, and that Samuel KIMBROUGH'S ancestors had lived for several generations in New Kent County, Virginia, and in the counties which were originally a part of it. Our reasons for believing this is that the tax lists of Louisa County show Samuel KIMBROUGH to have been a resident of that county from the year 1782 through 1789; and at this time, Captain Joseph KIMBROUGH, and other descendants of the first of the name in Virginia, were living in that county, and it is, therefore, most probable that they were related.

The records of Bourbon County show that in the year 1799 Samuel KIMBROUGH purchased land from Richard KIMBROUGH, which land was located in Green County on the little Barren River, and which he later left in a deed in which the consideration is "love and affection", given to his daughters, Sarah BARLOW, Elizabeth BAKER and Susanna JONES and his son Robert Harris KIMBROUGH, he states that he intends to move his place of residence and it is after this time that his name appears of the records in Nicholas County. It was, however, during his sojourn in Bourbon that most of his children were married.

An examination of the records in Nicholas County shows there were two of the name who died in that county at an early date, leaving wills, the above named Samuel and one Nathaniel KIMBROUGH, who was perhaps a brother, as the latter was found in the tax lists of Hanover County, Virginia, in 1791.

In the will of Nathaniel KIMBROUGH, recorded in Will Book "A", page 110, he bequeathed to his wife, Elizabeth, all he possessed in this world until his youngest child, John Winston KIMBROUGH, arrived at the age of 21 years, provided he remain single. Other children mentioned were Sarah Green KIMBROUGH, Major, George, Mary, John Winston, and he reserved for Charlotte WILLIAMS a part of his estate. This will was written September 25, 1807 and recorded in February of the following year. The will of Samuel KIMBROUGH appears in the same Book "A", on page 153, and reads as follows:

I, Samuel KIMBROUGH, of the County of Nicholas, being weak of body, but sound mind and memory do make, constitute and ordain the following writing to be my Last Will and Testament:

I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Cary KIMBROUGH, the unmolested use of my two negroes, to wit: Moses and Ezekiel during her life. I also give to my said wife Cary, one good Feather Bed and furniture to hers and her heirs forever. Item, I give and bequeath to my sons, John KIMBROUGH and Richard KIMBROUGH one dollar each.

Item, I give and bequeath to my daughter Betsy BAKER, one dollar.

Item, I give and bequeath to my son Robert H. KIMBROUGH, my riding horse, two cows and all my corn of the plantation I formerly lived on, that is to say the place James

CHANEY rented from me.

Item, the residue of my estate I give and bequeath to William KIMBROUGH, and Sally BARLOW and Susannah JONES, but my will is that my son, William KIMBROUGH, be entitled to two shares and Sally BARLOW and Susannah JONES to one share each. I do hereby constitute my friends, Wm BARLOW and William KIMBROUGH, Executors of my estate, thus declaring it to be my last will and testament whereof I have hereunto set my hand and it is affixed my seal this twelfth of February, one thousand eight hundred and ten.

Signed, sealed in presence of us - John COLLIER, John WEST.

Probated Nicholas County Court, February, 1810.

If from the foregoing notes, taken from the data we have collected during the past several years, anything of value has been added to your knowledge of the KIMBROUGHS, it is most gratifying, and it is our earnest desire that a thoroughly organized assistance (sic, rbk) of the family may be formed in order to make more thorough and far reaching research, both in this country and in Scotland.

Thomas A. KIMBROUGH at the age of 16 years, enlisted in Co. K.,
Carroll
Rifles, 11th Miss. Reg., and fought in the Army of Northern Virginia.
When
Co. K, in 1861, marched away to the war, Miss Charlie KIMBROUGH,
daughter of
Orman L. KIMBROUGH, presented the Company, in a patriotic speech,
with a
battle flag which it proudly carried into the battles of Virginia.
He was at
Gettysburg, his command being part of PICKETT'S Division. He was
wounded
twice in this battle but managed to reach the stone wall on the top
of the
Seminary Ridge. His regiment, together with several others, reached
what is
known as high tide in this great battle. There is a bronze marker
near the
old stone wall near General MEADE'S monument. On this marker appears
the
names of the units constituting PICKETT'S Division and among them
appears the
11th Miss. Regiment, which regiment was composed of the cream of the
young
manhood of Mississippi. Thomas KIMBROUGH and his cousin, James H.
KIMBROUGH,
were the sharp-shooters for Company K during the entire war. They
always went
far enough in advance of the line in order to contact enemy troops
and pick
off with their unerring aim enemy pickets and prowlers and then as
the battle
line of the enemy advanced in force, fell back on their own lines and
fought.
At the Battle of the Wilderness, Jimmie KIMBROUGH while on duty in
advance of
the line of battle, was seriously wounded. Thomas KIMBROUGH in the
face of
enemy fire and hampered by the dense woods, carried him to the rear.
(Ref. W.
F. HAMILTON).

Thomas A. KIMBROUGH was in the mercantile business at Jefferson under the name of KIMBROUGH AND BILLUPS. Later he devoted his interests to farming and ginning. At his own expense he furnished the lumber for a school building in his neighborhood. Why he located at Jefferson, a small island community, is explained by his son, Thomas C. KIMBROUGH. "My father was reared at Carrollton, but his uncle, Orman Lanier KIMBROUGH, a wealthy slave owner and land owner, lived on his farm near Jefferson. Dr. William A. BILLUPS, brother-in-law, was living at Jefferson also. It was therefore, quite natural for my father to locate near his kins people. His farm adjoined that of his uncle Orman L. KIMBROUGH".

KIMBROUGH graduated at the Univ. of Mississippi in 1895 with a Bachelor of Philosophy degree. After studying law in the office of his kinsman, Judge Allen M. KIMBROUGH in Greenwood and under Judge Edward MAYES in Jackson, he located for practice in West Point, Miss., in 1898 with Messrs. CRITZ and BECKETT, the firm later being known as CRITZ and KIMBROUGH. For many years he was prominent in the political and public life of Mississippi. He was appointed in 1916 Circuit Judge of the 16th Judicial District of Mississippi. In 1920 he was elected Professor of Law at the University of Mississippi. This information was copied from the notes of my father, William Landon David WILKINSON who copied his notes from the Bible at "Oak Hill" the BUMPASS home which joined "Needstone", the KIMBROUGH home in Hanover County, Virginia. The Bible along with much of the old furniture was either stolen or sold for little or nothing to roving antique hunters. Some of the furniture was made by John KIMBROUGH, Jr., a cabinet maker, for his daughter, Landonia. A desk, a small drop-leaf table, and a drum table said to have been made by him are in our possession.

Aunts Sarah, Lucy, Alice, and Uncle Jim lived at "Oak Hill" when my father took me, a child of eight, to visit them. Aunt Alice, although younger, died first. After the death of Aunt Lucy, the last sister, Uncle Jim came to make his home with us in Charles City, until his death in 1933.

Note: We are very much pleased to have this data from Miss WILKINSON. It opens another large branch of the family. I'm of the opinion that there are several members of the association that come from this family. We invite you to send in your connection to this branch if you have it. If you do not have it how about getting busy with your cousins, uncles, aunts, and all the rest and get it together and send to us in form to put in the quarterly. I will have to agree with Miss WILKINSON that there seems to be a connection with this branch and the Todd County, Kentucky branch of the KIMBROUGH family. The editor.

Random Notes About The Virginia KIMBROUGHES and Some of Their Descendants.

According to family tradition the KIMBROUGHES, both men and women, lived in Hanover County at Rock Castle on the North Anna River at the time of my father's birth, Oct. 24, 1861. The home was burned during the Civil War as were two other homes in which they lived. Grandfather was not accepted for active duty in the war due to an injury sustained while serving in the Texas Rangers resulting in a crippled leg. Instead he

supervised the raising of grain for the Confederate Army so he was frequently absent from home. His absence caused Grandmother to become very independent and self-sufficient. It has been said that she could ride and shoot like a trooper.

Daddy remembered the reconstruction period and often talked of the time when Virginia was Military District No. 1. However, he was not bitter. He told of one occasion when he went to the spring with the colored maid about dusk. Just as she filled the bucket, a KKK in full regalia stepped up and asked for a drink. When she handed him the gourd, he indicated that he wanted the bucket. He continued drinking until he had drunk seven buckets. At that time Daddy and the maid ran to the house and Grandfather had to go to the spring for water.

Two of Grandmother's sisters, Aunts Sarah and Lucy BUMPASS, aided the Confederates

in this manner. Aunt Sarah road a white mule (the only animal left) with General J. E. B. STUART and his cavalry to show the location of a secret ford on the South Anna River. General STUART returned her with special escort. Later a sick Yankee soldier was billeted at their home "Oak Hill". Aunt Lucy "borrowed" his uniform which she wore to climb a tree near the Yankee encampment where she obtained the current "password" and passed it to the Confederates. From this escapade she contracted smallpox which was what the Union soldier had. My father was educated in private schools. When he was nineteen, he, with his parents, moved to Charles City County, on of the eight original shires, established in 1634. According to the early maps it "extended indefinitely westward to the western ocean." Of course they were not aware the Pacific was 3,000 miles distant. After the death of my grandfather in 1895, Grandmother and Daddy bought "Byrdwood" which did not have a house at that time. They later built a house there in 1905, and that was where we children grew up, playing in the sand and wading in the James River about two miles wide at that point. We, of our generation, attended public schools. After graduation from high school, Linda and I were graduated from the State Teachers College, Farmville, Va., now Longwood College. I received a B. S. Degree in 1924 and she in 1930. Our brother, Edmund William Nelson WILKINSON, known as "Nelson" by the family but "Ned" to his contemporaries, attended Virginia Polytechnic Institute, Blacksburg, Virginia two years. He developed a difficulty in walking so the doctors advised that he return to a warmer climate. Later he completed the remainder of his college training by correspondence. He was employed as an engineer by the Virginia Department of Highways for a number of years. Later he served as engineer for the City of Suffolk, Virginia, its City Manager and also City Manager of Franklin, Virginia. At the time of his death he was Director of Public Relations for the Union-Bag-Camp Paper Corporation. Our sister-in-law and niece live in Franklin, Virginia. The latter is a junior at Randolph-Macon Women's College, Lynchburn, Virginia. My sister is an assistant supervisor in the State Rehabilitation Department, while I

am librarian at Hermitage High School, a senior high school in suburban Richmond.

Note: I have temporarily discontinued my line until I have the time to get back on it to clear up some details. Recently in Vol. III, No. 4, page 15 in the Census Record of Anderson Co., Texas, shown as 1860 which I have found to be the 1850 census there is a Bradley KIMBROUGH with wife Lucinda, and children William, Martha A., Sarah M. and Sidney (?). My inquiries have brought some wonderful findings I want to share for they have unearthed data on three branches of the family. One I have already noted in the Todd County, Kentucky data. Here we have Bradley KIMBROUGH and a William B. KIMBROUGH, both of whom came from Georgia through Alabama. Both lived in Tallapoosa County, Alabama before going to Texas.

July 29, 1967

Dear Mr. KIMBROUGH:

I am sorry I've been so long in getting to the Courthouse, but finally had time to go this week and was copying my notes when your letter came. There was only two entries in the records on one B. or Bradley KIMBROUGH in the Deed Books and none in Probate. Bradley evidently moved away from Anderson County in the 1850's. He probably moved farther West as many families did as new territory became safe from Indians.

I am enclosing the brief abstracts of records I found on all KIMBROUGHS from 1846 to 1882. If there are any questions concerning these records or if there are any you would like to have pursued further, please let me know. The 1860 and 1870 Census of Anderson County would help in working on these families. The Texas State Archives, Austin, Texas has an index of the 1850 and 1860 Census Records of Texas, giving the name of the head of a household, age, county of residence, place of birth and page number where the complete record can be found. If you could find a genealogist in Austin who could make a list of all the KIMBROUGHS in Texas in 1850-1860 it would help you locate your Bradley. A few years ago I exchanged work with a lady in Austin who looked up some records for me and she might

help you for a reasonable fee or on an exchange basis. Her name and address: Mrs. H. R. GENTRY, 3311 Clearview, Austin 3, Texas. (Note: I have contacted Mrs. GENTRY and she has agreed to work on it at so much per hour. I plan to contact her unless some of you good Texas members will go to the Archives and copy the data as noted above on the KIMBRO-KIMBROUGHS from the records in the Archives on the 1850-1860 Census. This would have an interest for many members as most all branches of the family had members that were in Texas by this time. I would delight putting it in the quarterly so that all might review it and make use of it as they see fit. The editor). There is a short history of Anderson County at the library with a few families featured, but I don't remember the KIMBROUGH name, however, I will check right away and see. I believe there is a Rusk Co. History also but will have to check. You know how most of the county histories are- their pages are devoted to the most prominent families, whose descendants are still prominent and some of the very early settlers who have moved on are not mentioned unless they became famous. I will contact the Mr. KIMBROUGH here and get all the information he can give me right away. Some people are not interested in family history and won't answer letters, but the ones that do make the effort of writing worth while. (Note: This Mr. KIMBROUGH mentioned according to letter from his wife knew little or nothing of the family and he had come in from another part of Texas to this county in the past few years. The editor). (The letter continues with information on her family connections in Alabama on which I have consented to help. I will mention the family names so that in case any of the readers might have these family connections they might find another kinsman. John Wesley GURGANUS, born 1806 in Edgefield Co., S. C., settled in Walker Co., Ala. about 1830. George W. BARKER who m. Levina TAYLOR in Tuscaloosa Co., Alabama. Their son Geo. W. BARKER, Jr. was b. in Tuscaloosa Co., 1855. The editor).

KIMBROUGH, 320 acres on Waters of Catfish Creek 23 miles N.W. from Palestine- Certificate No. 1063 issued by Commissioners of MERCER'S Colony on 18 June 1850 and transferred to said Bradley KIMBROUGH, 29 June 1855.

Book "J", p. 72.- Bradley KIMBROUGH sold the above land to Tillman PATERSON and Henry FLEMING of Ellis Co., Texas for \$350.00, 20 Sept. 1858. Wit: Joseph H. GORDON and John H. KIMBROUGH.

Note: This is the only record found on Bradley KIMBROUGH other than the marriage record. He evidently did not live in Anderson County after he sold the above land.

He sold his land to men living in Ellis County and he may have moved to that County.

Although a patent to the above land was granted in 1855, Bradley was probably living on the land in 1850. The William B. KIMBROUGH who assigned the land to him was probably a brother? Mamie Stafford.

Book "M", p. 371- John H. KIMBROUGH and wife Margaret Ann to Wash MEREDITH, 220 acres on Salene Creek, MEREDITH'S Headright - 12 Dec. 1868.

Note: The above William B. KIMBROUGH and Bradley KIMBROUGH were not brothers but probably cousins the best I can now ascertain. I am of the opinion that the William KIMBRO could be the William B. KIMBROUGH. It would be interesting to find the connection is any. If you know it send it in. The editor.

Deed Book "T", p. 349.- James C. CALDWELL, guardian of Sarah H. and Mollie G. KIMBROUGH, minors, sold land to Jacob CRIST- land 8 miles S.W. from Palestine known as John CARPENTER Bounty Land- Undivided interest of said minors, being 93« acres at \$1.00 per acre. James CALDWELL guardian of Sarah H. and Mabell G. Recorded 24 Nov. 1876.

(Note: There was reference to Sarah H. and Mabell KIMBROUGH in the Probate Index Book, but I did not have time to check on it the other day as the Court house closed before I could get to it. Mamie Stafford).
