BRADLEY KIMBROUGH - REV. DUKE KIMBROUGH - DUKE WHITMAN KIMBROUGH

Mrs. James E. FLOWERS, 129 Holmes, Covington, Tennessee 38019, has provided me with a letter written by Duke Whitman KIMBROUGH to his son Bradley Thomas KIMBROUGH, Mrs. FLOWERS' grandfather in 1866. (Copy). In addition Mrs. Flowers provided me considerable data on her family which I hope to provide in an upcoming issue. I believe the following is one of the finest letters that could be written by a father to his son. I regret that we cannot publish it as it is in beautiful script.

(FROM COPY OF ORIGINAL LETTER) Jan. 16, 1866

Dear Thomas:

I have received your letter dated Dec. 6th, 1865. I am ever anxious to hear from you, and it gives me increased pleasure to hear that you are well, and earnestly engaged in preparing yourself for usefulness and respectability. I heartily approve of the decision you have made to apply your youthful energies in the pursuit of knowledge. For next to virtue and religion, knowledge is of the greatest value. But the most thorough education without religion and virtue is incomplete; for they only, prepare us for the proper use of knowledge; and an improper use of it will always fail to make us deservedly eminent or truly great. Whereas religion and virtue are priceless jewels, the brightest ornaments of earth, and give not only happiness, but grace and dignity to all who wear them. I hope that you my son, possess these ornaments, and wear them daily. I hope and believe this because I believe you are born of God, and I hear, from one, of reliable authority, that our deportment is strictly moral. Next to myself, my chief desire is, the present and future happiness of my children. Which is obtained by the favor of God, who freely bestows it on all who fear and obey him.

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In reply to your request for pecuniary aid , in geting an education, I will say, I hope to be able to give you and Birch some assistance. I am anxious to do so; and told Jacob while he was with me, that I would send money to him, to be divided between you and Birch at his own discretion. I will send him some as soon as I can. I cannot tell now, how soon, nor

how much. But I hope to be able to send you some money during the present year. Be sure of this, however, that I will do the best I can for you. It is a difficult time to raise money here now, on account of its scarcity, and an act of the legislature, giving four years stay on debts. William DUGGAN has not yet been able to collect money to pay his note that was due the 25th of December; and when he will get it I cannot tell. Also, I owe some borrowed money that I am bound by honor and my own pecuniary interest, to pay as soon as I can get money to do so. Therefore be patient and hopeful, and persevere in your studies; practice economy, love virtue, honor your Heavenly father, and he will provide for you and bless you. For He has promised that he will withhold no good thing from them that walk uprightly.

Oh! how unsearchable is the love of God to his children. The vivil law is being enforced here now and mobing and all other heathenish practices are pretty well subdued, so we are having quiet times.

Write to me frequently.

This leaves us all in normal health.

P. S. (In margin between the pages) I delayed writing some time hoping to be able to be able to give a more explicit and satisfactory answer.

Give my love to Brother Bradley and family.

Note: This brother Bradley KIMBROUGH was a Baptist minister and educator and lived in Lincoln County, Tennessee for several years and is buried there and still has descendants in the county. I picked up a copy of a deed made to him in Maury Co., Tennessee this Christmas. The Christmas preceding I copied his will in Fayetteville, Lincoln Co., Tennessee. Unfortunately I was unable to decipher some of the script in the will is one reason I've delayed publishing it. I've also been unable to decipher the deed from Maury Co., Tennessee.

GOLDMAN KIMBROUGH FAMILY CONTINUED:

Note: The following data was found by your editor during this past Christmas on a one day flight into Tennessee. I went to Maury Co., Tennessee hoping to find some more data on the James KIMBROUGH family that settled in Giles Co., Tennessee, but instead I found only early records on two other branches, the Bradley KIMBROUGH and the Goldman KIMBROUGH families.

Goldman KIMBROUGH came from North Carolina in 1813 and settled in Maury Co., Tennessee. He bought the following tract of land from William POLK, through his son Samuel POLK, the father of James Knox POLK, the President of the U. S. who was instrumental in the territorial expansion of these United States. When Goldman sold his lands in 1816 and came to Franklin Co., Ala. he sold two tracts, one to Samuel POLK and one to Benjamin POLK, presumably a brother of Samuel. You will note by these deeds that Goldman took on the nickname of "GOLD" KIMBROUGH.

Thomas KIMBROUGH rescued him and carried him to the rear. James H.
KIMBROUGH was a prosperous farmer of Carroll County and dealt in

livestock. They are buried in the Kimbrough Family Cemetery at Carrollton. Lucinda Catherine was a niece of Samuel MOORE, who m. Mary Ann 4 KIMBROUGH.

THOMSON - KIMBROUGH

(Additional Report from Findings in Louisa County, Virginia and elsewhere).

"My Ancestry" by Martinetter V. WITHERSPOON, 1922, copy in Congressional Library, page 141. Samuel THOMSON emigrated from Wales to America and settled in Virginia 1717, he married Mary MCDONALD of Scotland, May 1726. (Note: I believe his ancestors were in Virginia long before). Their son

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William THOMPSON born Aug 13, 1727, married Jan. 28, 1752 Ann RODES. He died in Louisa County, Virginia April 27, 1778. His wife and children moved from Louisa County 1789. Ann (RODES) THOMSON died near Georgetown, Kentucky, July 29, 1802. They had 12 children, Annie, Rodes, Mary, Wm., Clifton, Asa, John, Eunice or Emmie, Elizabeth, Lydia, David, and Sarah, etc. The foregoing was sent to me by Mrs. William SWEENEY, 127 North Broadway Park, Lexington, Ky, with the following note:

The will of Samuel THOMSON in 1753. "His last wife Temperance" mentioned and children William and others. Mrs. SWEENEY, as I wrote you, gave Samuel KIMBROUGH mentioned in the will of Samuel THOMSON of Louisa as the son of his (Samuel's) daughter Sarah KIMBROUGH instead of his son (or son-in-law) and in checking this record again I found the will book which had been photostated was torn and the space after bequest to daughter Sarah KIMBROUGH to whom he left one negro named Sambo could well have carried "to daughter Sarah KIMBROUGH's" son Samuel as Mrs. SWEENEY had stated the original did as it was torn off at edge of page and next line began "son Samuel KIMBROUGH one cow and calf". We can be fairly safe in assuming that the mother of Samuel KIMBROUGH of Nicholas County, Kentucky was Sarah THOMSON and from the following records I found she was the wife of Bradley KIMBROUGH, son of John KIMBROUGH of Hanover County, Virginia, and these moved to North Carolina where he had a land grant. Also, in an old abstract of this will made by my sister before the original was photostated I see she gives it "to daughter Sarah KIMBROW, to her son Samuel KIMBROW".

In the files of my sister, Miss SPENCER of Louisa County, Virginia, I found a letter written by Mrs. Robert A. KIMBROUGH, Jr., address: Box 255 Kent Road, Wynnewood, Pa., who writes for information regarding her husband's ancestor Bradley KIMBROUGH who was originally of Louisa County, Virginia and given a grant of 300 acres (State Grant) of land located on the Randolph County line, N. C., May 18, 1789. She states he died before July 8, 1795 at which time his sons Jesse, Thomas, Marmaduke ("Duke") and David sold the land and were "of Rowan County, North Carolina". She continued "in History of the CARLOCK Family is our line of KIMBROUGHS back to Bradley". She also states that in a sketch written by a grandson of Bradley KIMBROUGH he says: "I first mention my grandfather Bradley,

son of John KIMBROUGH, who was born in Virginia and moved to Rowan County, North Carolina. He married Sarah THOMPSON. They raised six children: Jesse, Thomas, Duke, Amelia, Anna and David". In her letter Mrs. KIMBROUGH said Sarah THOMSOM was of South Carolina but of course she found out she was of Louisa County, Virginia, after searches were made. Since Samuel KIMBROUGH, it appears, never went to North Carolina nor do we have record of Nathaniel KIMBROUGH (his brother?) going, it is quite natural that these two were unknown to the grandson of Bradley KIMBROUGH who wrote the sketch. Father and sons may have gone their separate ways and about the same time. We have the date of birth of one Duke KIMBROUGH (Marmaduke KIMBROUGH) as November 19, 1762 and he died in Tennessee.

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Deed Book A, page 277, May 26, 1747, Louisa County, Virginia.

Bradley KIMBROUGH and Sarah his wife of Fredericksville Parish County of Louisa to John GRAVES, Junr. of the Parish of St. George and County of Spotsylvania a tract of land lying on the north branch of Great Rocky Creek in Louisa County, it being part of the land granted John KIMBROUGH, the Elder, bearing date the 7th of November 1728 and conveyed by deed of gift from the said Jno. KIMBROUGH, Sr. unto John KIMBROUGH, Jr. and by him conveyed unto the said Bradley KIMBROUGH containing 200 acres more or less and bounded by Samuel MACGEHEE'S line.

Witnesses: Wm. JOHNSON Signed: Bradley C. KIMBROW
Wm. SHELTON Sarah E. KIMBROW
Jo. BECKLEY

(Note: Both Bradley and Sarah signed this early document.)

(Note: Since John KIMBROW (KIMBROUGH) who died in Louisa County, Virginia with wife Elizabeth named only one son, William in his will, and since this John KIMBROW was deeding land in Louisa in 1742 it would appear he was of the same generation as Bradley (who was son of John) and that both were sons of John KIMBROW "the elder" who was also a son of John KIMBROW the emigrant.)

Summary: John KIMBROUGH, styled Senr., in 1699 married Margaret (probably a WINSTON) b. ca. 1654 Eng. as his second wife. His first wife was Mary.

John KIMBROUGH had married Elizabeth BRADLEY dau. of Hon. Thomas BRADLEY (?), member House of Burgesses.

John KIMBROUGH had married Elizabeth ---- died in Louisa Co., Va., 1765, - Son Wm.

Bradley KIMBROUGH and others. Bradley married Sarah THOMSON, daughter of Samuel THOMSON of "Fredericksville Parish".

In the magazine Genealogy and History published in Washington, D. C. the last issue gives Temperance wife of Samuel THOMSON as his "third wife".

In some Notable Families in America by Annah R. WATSON (small book, wrapperbound) page 51 is a brief note on the THOMSON family with coat-of-arms as follows: It is said Sir Roger THOMPSON came to America commissioned in the service of England at the time of Bacon's Rebellion. His wife's name unknown but his son William was the father of Martha who married James TAYLOR who were grandparents of President James MADISON. The name is sometimes spelled THOMSON, etc.

In the Genealogy of the THOMSON FAMILY by Betty Bush WINGER,

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184 Pt. Pleasant, West Virginia, (this is a manuscript at Duncan Tavern, Paris, Ky.) she states William THOMSON, Gent of Blair Manor, Ayreshire, Scotland, was the father of Samuel THOMSON and that the line is traced in the Ayreshire, Scotland to about 1400. She states that Samuel THOMSON came to America about 1717 and married Mary MCDONALD in Virginia in 1726 and so far as is known he had one son William THOMSON who had son Rodes born 1754. Rodes had Asa, etc. and the name Roger appears among descendants. (Note: I believe Miss or Mrs. WINGER had not done much searching and is wrong in some of her statements: Mrs. ARDERY). However, the fact that she gives Roger as a name in the Rodes THOMSON family and there was a Roger THOMSON in Louisa County, Virginia, your Samuel, son of William (if this is correct) may be grandson or descendant of Sir Roger THOMSON from England.

Louisa County Deed Book A, 1744. Roger THOMPSON of St. Paul's Parish, Hanover County, Virginia to Joseph FOSTER of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co. Granted tract in Louisa containing 300 acres, part of a patent granted Roger THOMSON by patent dated 1732 (Page number not given in Deed Book. editor)

Book A, page 508, Louisa County. George THOMASSON from Samuel THOMSON a tract dated May 22, 1753. George THOMASSON in May 1763 for good causes, he of Trinity Parish, deed son, William, son Thomas, son Richard and son John tracts of 200 acres each. Witnesses: Jno. BYERS, Nicholas TALLY.

Louisa Co., Va. Book A, page 473, July 28, 1752. Samuel THOMSON, Sr. deeds Samuel THOMSON, Jr. (Note: This is complete. Ed.)

In the Library of Duncan Tavern, Paris, Kentucky, there is a very old chart (printed) undated and without the name of the compiler. On it is written "Given to Sophia Hart ARNOLD of Covington by her cousin Sallie Taylor CUNNINGHAM". Miss Sophia ARNOLD died sometime ago in advanced years. This chart carries the THOMSON arms and begins with Sir Roger

THOMPSON. It reads in brief as follows:

In CROMWELL'S war Sir Roger THOMPSON was knighted. During Bacon's Rebellion (1674-75) Colonel William THOMPSON, youngest son of Sir Roger, was sent to America in command of a regiment at the request of Lord BERKELEY of Virginia, etc., but when he found BERKELEY was oppressing the colonists he resigned his command in the English army. He married and settled on the James River. He was the father of John THOMPSON who married Rebecca CLAIRBORNE and Martha his sister married in 1699 James TAYLOR who located 10,000 acres in Orange County, Virginia.

Col. Roger THOMPSON, son of John and Rebecca THOMPSON married Miss FOSTER in 1700. His country estate was on Blackwell Neck, Hanover County, Virginia. His immense estate descended to his eldest son Joseph THOMPSON who married his cousin Sarah CLAIRBORNE. Her mother's name was Ann FOX and grandfather was

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Colonel John WEST, her father was Colonel Thomas CLAIRBORNE. Colonel Roger THOMPSON died in 1764.

(Note: The will of Asa THOMSON is filed in Fayette County, Kentucky, Jan. 25, 1842, in which the first son named is Roger THOMSON. Note will of Samuel THOMSON, his father.)

The Royal Descent of Martha THOMSON, wife of James TAYLOR from King Robert BRUCE, crowned Scotland 1306 was given in an old issue of the Baltimore Sun and stated to have been copied from the Genealogical Tree of the Royal Family of Stewart, printed in Edinburg, and sold in Glasgow in 1739.

(TYPEWRITTEN COPY AT STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY) (Note: presumed to be Kentucky. Ed.)

Margery BRUCE (daughter of King Robert I) m. 1314 Walter, Lord High STEWARD, of Scotland born 1293, died April 9, 1336. Their son Robert STEWARD, known as Robert II married Elizabeth, dau. of Sir Adam MUIE, of Rosevallon (?), had King Robert STEWARD, III, born 1390 died 1406 m. Lady Annabel DRUMMOND, their dau., Margaret STEWART married Archibald, fourth Earl of Douglas, who died 1424. He went to France with Scottish Army to fight the English in 1423, was created Duke of Turaine by Charles VII, had James DOUGLAS who married Lady Beatrice STEWART, their daughter, Lady Janet DOUGLAS married Sir Robert FLEMING (son of Malcolm), son of David FLEMING who married Lady Elizabeth STEWART (STUART), granddaughter of Robert II, King of Scotland. The son of Lady Janet DOUGLAS and Sir Robert FLEMING was Sir Malcolm FLEMING who married Lady Euphemia LIVINGSTONE, their son was John FLEMING, Lord Chamberlain of Scotland married Lady Euphemia DRUMMOND, had Malcolm FLEMING. Malcolm FLEMING was

Lord Chamberlain and Master of Ordinance to Edward VI. He married Johanna STEWART, their daughter was Lady Bridget FLEMING married Richard THOMPSON of Houghton (son of John THOMPSON of Thornton and Pickering-Leigh, Yorkshire, England and his wife Eleanor PHILLIPS of Brickwell, their son was Richard THOMPSON. (Note: following Sir Roger on maternal side.)

Richard THOMPSON, son of forgoing Lady Bridget FLEMING and Richard THOMPSON, married Ann, only daughter and heir of Sir Roger THOMPSON, of Scarborough (Sir Robert having had two sons both of whom died without issue) their son Colonel William THOMPSON of Blackwell's Neck, Hanover County, Virginia married Martha (____). He was an officer in the British Army, a man of wealth and influence. He figured very conspicuously in Bacon's Rebellion and also served as a Colonel in the Virginia Colony 1678-80. Daughter Martha THOMPSON married Col. James TAYLOR, Jr., etc.

Note: Your Samuel THOMSON was in all probability of this Hanover County, Virginia. The will of George THOMASSON filed in Louisa named son Fleming. Will dated 1783. The will of Samuel THOMSON named son Asa who came to Kentucky and who named eldest son Roger.

MEMORIAL TO ALBERT GRAHAM KIMBROUGH, SR.

In 1888 Shelby County and the CITY OF Memphis, its County Seat, were struggling upward from the terrible gloom into which they had been thrust by the two successive plagues of yellow fever. The County's credit was not good, and its institutions were in poor shape, and its future outlook seemed dark indeed. In that year Albert Graham KIMBROUGH was elected a member of the Shelby County Court, and forthwith began to devote himself to the rehabilitation and recovery of the County in which he was born.

Thence forward his record as a member of the County Court was one of constant service, with a broadness of vision and a confidence in the future which made him a tower of strength for every humanitarian movement and for every plan which strengthened the County's credit and redounded to the comfort and safety of its citizens.

From the time he was first elected until ill health forced his retirement

he was constantly a member of the County Court of this County. He was Chairman of this body in 1897, 1898 and 1899, and continued, on his retirement as Chairman, to carry on the work which he had so skillfully directed as presiding officer of the Court.

When Squire BARRET resigned as Chairman of the Court in July 1907, A. G. KIMBROUGH was elected by acclamation and unanimously to fill the vacant post. He was then re-elected in 1908 and 1909, and has the record equalled by no member of this Court of having served three successive terms on two separate and distinct occasions.

As early as 1910 ill health had begun to dim his vigorous physical powers, and in 1912 he was forced at the expiration of his term to retire from the County Court, which he had served for a continuous period of twenty-four years. He had, during the time he was connected with this Court, the unusual experience of having both his son and his son-in-law members of the Court at the time that he was Chairman thereof.

During the time he was a member of the Shelby County Court the name of Albert Graham KIMBROUGH is connected with some of the most important governmental reforms that have taken place in the history of the County. He was the constant and persistent advocate of a Bill which would give to the County a better system of roads and would cause the roads to be taken out of the realm of petty politics. It was largely through his untiring efforts that the original Bill Road Law was placed upon the statute books.

The need of mother's pensions was a constant source of thought and effort on his part, and he had the honor of seeing the Mother's Pension enacted during his administration.

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He also advocated and saw passed the Bill under which the Boys Industrial School was built at Bartlett, thus taking the young delinquent out of the class of the criminal and recognizing him as proper subject for reform.

The New County Court House was built during the Chairmanship of Squire KIMBROUGH and this building, as the old-timers will recall, possesses the unusual distinction of having been built within the original appropriation and estimates, and without even the bitterest foes of those who built it claiming that there was any form of extravagance connected with its construction.

But the efforts of Squire KIMBROUGH were not confined to such matters as could be done by Court itself. He realized the importance of a compact and business-like County Government for a County as large as this, and he was one of the earliest advocates of a County Commission for Shelby

County. When this was finally enacted into law he had the pleasure of seeing his son-in-law, who had sat in the court with him, become a member of the first Shelby County Commission, and the KIMBROUGH tradition has endured until today, for Mr. E. W. HALE, promoted from Secretary to Chairman, has been a continuous member of the Commission since it was formed.

After he retired from the County Court because of his unfortunate illness, Squire KIMBROUGH kept in close touch with public affairs and was always interested in any movement which tended to increase the benefits to the citizens, and at the same time was a constant advocate of a lower tax rate whenever reduction was possible.

During his long illness, which he bore with a Christian fortitude which was the marvel of all who knew him, he was ready at all times to consult with those who were interested in the welfare and the future of Shelby County, and to give from his long store of experience suggestions and advice which were always well worth while.

Such a record of public service as a member of this Court is sufficient to give to Squire KIMBROUGH a permanent place among those who are responsible for the growth and welfare of this County in which we all take a justifiable pride, and so closely and so long was he identified with the public life of the County that as one looks about and sees the roads in which he was interested, the buildings for which he was responsible, we feel that we can almost say, "If you seek an epitaph of Squire KIMBROUGH, look about Shelby County."

His record of public service entitles him to the lasting respect and admiration of those interested in the County's welfare, but behind his public service was a firmness, coupled with a gentleness of character, which endeared him to all of those whose pleasure it was to know him.

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The welfare of Shelby County was close to Squire KIMBROUGH'S heart because it was essentially his native land. He was born in the century old family residence, "Cotton Plant", near Germantown, in 1854, and lived in the same residence until he died at the age of eighty, on November 20, 1934.

To his friends and neighbors he was the genial, pleasant advisor and confidential friend. Into his ears were poured the troubles of hundreds of persons who went away fortified and encouraged by the advice and comfort he gave them.

He was educated in the schools of Shelby County, and on his maturity joined the Masonic Order and was a Master Mason in 1876. He took the

Royal Arch Degree and was made a High Priest in 1887 and Grand High Priest of the State in 1895. His fraternal work was always to his heart, and he felt that through it he had another opportunity of doing good.

He joined the Methodist Church when he was a small boy and retained his connection therewith throughout his life as a devout and active member. He was elected Trustee and Steward of the Church and served in that capacity for more than a quarter of a century.

In his business affairs he was successful, not becoming wealthy, for seeking after riches was impossible to a nature as gentle and as charitable as his. He was from his manhood until his death beloved by those who knew him best and who loved him as a man without regard to any official position which he might hold.

His family life was a beautiful one. His first wife was the late Willie A. PETTUS, by whom he had six children, four of whom survive. They are: Mrs. E. W. HALE of Whitehaven, Albert Graham KIMBROUGH, Jr., and Mrs. Maria K. BACON, of Memphis and Mrs. C. E. ALLEN, of St. Louis. His second wife is Mrs. V. H. KIMBROUGH, who survives him.

A politician who was respected and admired even by those who fought him, a leader who was followed unquestionably and gladly by those of his own faction, he set an example of unselfish devotion to public welfare which was unusual at the time that he adopted it. He lived to see those ideals of County Government and public affairs which he had advocated crystallized and continued, and his mantle passed on to a member of his own family, who has now for a quarter of a century kept stainless and bright the banner intrusted to him.

A worthy Statesman, a Christian gentleman, a loyal friend, a patient bearer of the cross that was thrust upon him, Albert Graham KIMBROUGH has furnished us with a life which we would like to see made a pattern for those who are to come.

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We move that this memorial be spread upon the minutes of this Court, and that a copy thereof be sent to the family of the deceased.

DR. KIMBROUGH DIES ON VISIT - Led Prayer Service Last Night.

Dr. B. T. KIMBROUGH, retired Baptist minister and educator of Louisville, Ky., died at 5:30 a.m. today in Memphis at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Ralph C. BETHEA, 2098 James Road.

Dr. KIMBROUGH, brother of Mrs. John W. MCCALL of 2034 James Road and uncle of Mrs. BETHEA, was visiting in Memphis. He was in charge of prayer services last night at First Baptist Church. His topic was "The Keys of the Kingdom."

Dr. KIMBROUGH was up and writing in his diary when he had a heart attack, relatives said.

He leaves a wife and two sons, B. T. KIMBROUGH, Jr., and Dr. George B. KIMBROUGH, all of Louisville.

The founder of several Baptist Churches in Kentucky, Dr. KIMBROUGH had served as a professor at Louisville Baptist Seminary.

Services will be held tomorrow in Louisville.

The father gave the small son to a family named WILLWORD as a bond boy.
B. F. KIMBROUGH being a soldier was sent to Texas and believed killed.
At the age of 16 young Wilford was given \$10, and a horse and was sent
out on his own. He worked for a man named Doc. Van SIENA trading with
the Indians from Alabama to Oklahoma. Here he bought an Indian girl for
one blanket and kept her for two or three years. There was no children
born to them so far as known. He left his Indian wife and friends and
went on to Texas where it is said that he found information along with a
trunk and a will left him by his father. The will involved a log (sic,
rbk) of land under the Texas land grant, (soldiers were often paid in
land) in what is now Houston, Texas. When the Civil War began W. B.
KIMBROUGH went away to serve the cause and left the trunk and papers in a
hotel, later the hotel burned down and all was lost.

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Wilford B. KIMBROUGH was married several times: First Bama FRAIZE, who
died in childbirth: 2nd Sally SIMMONS, who had one child, a daughter
named Betty Lue KIMBROUGH who married a man named FERGSON. They lived in
Texas and there were no children born to this marriage. Sally (SIMMONS)
KIMBROUGH died with her second child. William B. KIMBROUGH married the
