We will likely shorten each quarterly somewhat and not try to write a book each time; as I was attempting to do at the time I ceased to produce.

You will note that we have dispensed with the continued data from previous copies for the present. I would hope to reach in and pick up where we left off in future issues.

Many things have happened to your editor and to many of the Kimbro-Kimbroughs that I know living in Alabama and around. My interest in the family has not waned. I have continued to do research which I like more than trying to prepare it for publication. I've researched in Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi, and even in Tennessee since I last prepared a copy of the Quarterly.

This past year, I researched the old Bradford Factory, first cotton-woolen factory in Alabama located in Coosa County in 1830's because my four direct lines, the Kimbroughs, Browns, Hesters, and Neighbors were connected from time to time with this community which was on the old plank road between Wetumpka and Winterboro in Talladega County. I was born in Kellyton some four miles from this area. I hope someday to do a bit more research and publish the same.

I'm much involved with building two items on which I've already obtained patent on one and am having a search made on the other. One is a portable deep fryer assembly called the *PARTI-FRIER*, the other is a lure retriever which I call the *LUR'GET'R*. I've set up a hobby shop in my garage and am making up a number of each to try to put on market hoping that I might get an interested manufacturer so that I can go on to some other ideas I would like to develop before I get to old to carry on in such fashion.

was married to Miss Rianna LEGG, of Prince William County, Va., in the
year March 18, 1824.

Miss Rianna LEGG was born November 27, 1803. Died September 1, 1864.

Elder Matthew P. SMITH settled in North Greene County in 1827. His wife,
Rianna (LEGG) SMITH, was baptized in 1837, Grant's Creek Baptist Church,
Fosters, Alabama.

Was wounded. Before and after war he taught school until 1877. Captain James T. SMITH was prominent in politics, serving as Tax Assessor from 1870-1875, and Tax Collector 1876-1877, took office as soon as Democrats were permitted at close of Reconstruction. He was one of the leaders in fight for white supremacy. His sword is now (1967) in possession of James KIMBROUGH SMITH, III, Birmingham, Alabama.

 Page 105:
 JEFFERSON F. WRIGHT (2/21/1822?) son of Wiley and Sarah, married 2nd in Greene Co., 4/29/49, Mrs. Louisa Rowland Kimbrough. They lived in the Walder's Methodist Church area of Greene County until about 1880 when they moved to Benton, Arkansas. Jefferson was County Surveyor of Greene Co. The Feb. 18, 1848 issue of the Southern Christian Advocate gives data on Jefferson's first wife -- "Died in Greene County, Ga. near White Plains, 16 Oct., 1847, Mrs. Lucy A. F. Wright, consort of Jefferson F. Wright and daughter of Charles Burke. Born 21st Nov. 1830." She and Jefferson married on 10/29/46.
 Jefferson, according to records in my file, surveyed the City of Little Rock, and other places in Arkansas. They had no children, however, Louisa

had one daughter by her first marriage, Mary Kimbrough, who married on 10/23/1856, Charles R. Hutchinson. Mary died when her two daughters, Mollie and Julia were young children. They were reared by Jefferson and Louisa and moved to Arkansas with them. In 1850 Census Greene County, Jefferson's age given as 28, Louisa's as 25.

LAST RITES FOR MRS. KIMBROUGH (1867-1965)

Mrs. Nell Williams Kimbrough, one of Greensboro's oldest and most beloved citizens, died September 20, 1965, at the Sandersville Nursing Home. she was born Oct. 1, 1867, in Penfield, Ga., and her parents were Frances Wright Williams and Will Williams.

Mrs. Kimbrough received her education at Gordon Institute, Barnesville. She was a devoted member of the Greensboro Methodist Church.

For many years "Miss Nell", as she was affectionately called, taught music in the Greensboro School. Her excellent knowledge of music, the arts, and better things of life, caused her to exert wonderful influence on the lives of many young people.

For a number of years she owned and operated the private picture show in Greensboro. She not only was blessed with artistic ability, but was a splendid business woman. She was known for her wisdom, keen mind, wonderful sense of humor and interest in her fellowman. She was generous to a fault.

Although she would have been 98 years old on Oct. 1st, she was interested in her friends, her church and life in general. She was active and unusually alert for one of her age until she had a stroke on September 20.

With the death of Miss Nell, Greensboro has lost a lovely lady, whose useful and happy life will long be remembered. She was an inspiration to all who had the good fortune to know her.

Her husband, Mr. Walter Kimbrough, preceded her in death a number of years ago.

Survivors include two nephews, Eugene Williams of Wisconsin, and Gary Williams of Decatur; four nieces, Mrs. Fannie Wright of Atlanta, Mrs. Curtis Glass and Mrs. Joe Davis of LaGrange, and Mrs. Chrls. Stone, Macon; Cousins, Mrs. Mary Anderson Ponder, Madison and Mrs. Leonora Ingram, Eatonton.

Funeral services were held Sept. 22nd at 4:00 PM at the Methodist Church, Reverend Jack Nichols and Reverend J. W. Eberhardt officiating.

Interment in the City Cemetery.

This indenture made this, second day of June one thousand seven hundred and ninety four between William Kimbrough and Rebeccah his wife of the County of Greene and State of Georgia of the one part and Rich Lewis of the County and State aforesaid of the other part. Witnesses that the said Wm. Kimbrough and Rebeccah his wife for and in consideration of the sum of one hundred pounds sterling in had paid the receipt whereof he the said Wm. Kimbrough and Rebeccah do hereby acknowledge, grant, bargained, sold alined in fee of released and confirmed unto the said Rich Lewis his

Heirs and assigns forever a certain tract or parcel of land containing one hundred thirty seven acres three quarters situate lying and being in the County of Greene and State of aforesaid on the waters of Riceland Creek being part of that tract the said Kimbrough purchased of Micajah Williamson's land adjoining Wm. Baldwin's land on the one side and John Bushe's on the other side beginning at a Gum Corner standing on a path that lead from the said Bushe's to Wm. Kimbrough's land -- Which lines were agreed on between the said Kimbrough and Thomas Connell together with all and singular the rights, members and appurtenances thereof whatsoever to the said track or parcel of land belonging or in any wise appertaining thereunto and also all the estate, right, title, interest, claim and demand of him the said Wm. Kimbrough and Rebeccah his wife their heirs. The said tract or parcel of land and all and singular the premises and to his heirs and assigns against him the said Wm. Kimbrough and his wife their heirs and assigns against all and every other person or persons whatever shall and will warrant and forever defend by these presents in witness whereof the said Wm. Kimbrough and Rebeccah his wife hath hereunto set their hands and office and their seals the day and year first above written.

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MRS. W. M. KIMBROUGH

The Greensboro Woman's Society of Christian Service would like to pay tribute to the memory of one of its oldest and most faithful members, Mrs. W. M. Kimbrough, who died September 20, 1965.

Mrs. Kimbrough, the former Nell Williams, daughter of Frances Wright Williams, was born on October 1, 1867, in Penfield, Georgia. Later, the family moved to Barnesville where "Miss Nell", as she was affectionately called received her education at Gordon Institute. Several years ago this school conferred upon her the honorary rank of Major.

As a young woman, Miss Nell returned to Greene County with her mother and lived in Greensboro. For a number of years, she taught music, being a talented musician. She was married to Mr. Walter Kimbrough, a native of Greene County, who preceded her in death on May 6, 1937. For many years Mr. and Mrs. Kimbrough owned and operated the Greenland Theater where they made many friends throughout Greene and adjoining counties. "Miss Nell" was a devoted and loyal member of the Greensboro Methodist Church and was active in many phases of its program. She had taught a Sunday school class, served as chairman of a circle in the Woman's Missionary Society.

Mr. KIMBROUGH was also mentioned by Mr. E. R. E. KIMBROUGH, in one of his letters to Mrs. W. B. ARDERY which was published in previous issue of Quarterly under the GOLDMAN KIMBROUGH LINE. Mr. S.

G. KIMBROUGH is retired from American Tobacco Co.
Mrs. Orr provided the following on Mr. S. G. KIMBROUGH.
"Sidney Garth KIMBROUGH is my cousin twice removed. His father, Charles, like my father, was a planter. S. G.'s brother Emory (now deceased) was president of a bank in Clarksville, Tenn. His son John is now president of the same bank. There was a sister Gladys who never married so far as I know."

(A letter passed by Mrs. Orr from a cousin who is now a member of Association. This letter indicates that Mr. Robert T. KIMBROUGH might be a source for some wonderful information on this branch of the family as well as some of the others. We hope that he will make available some of this data if he feels that it will add to what is herein provided. The editor hopes that Mr. KIMBROUGH will not mind us using his letter as he has mentioned some people that have been very important to us as you will see. CHK)

Dear Cousin Martha:

Your letter of May 2nd was the nicest thing that has happened to me in a long time. I appreciate it very much, and when I return from Maine (even farther from "Home Base", but we love it), I'll try to fill you in with all the family data I possess. In former years I carried on quite extensive correspondence with various members of our clan (mostly of the North Carolina-

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Alabama--Texas--branches). At Williamsburg, Va., we met an Alabama grass widow of an Alabama KIMBROUGH (She also is a Doctor) who had considerable interest and data; but her's too related to the Alabama Branch. Then, about 4 or 5 years ago, increasing demands on my time by added responsibilities--and perhaps partly laziness--caused me to neglect this correspondence to the extent that I am now almost ashamed to write to such avid researchers and faithful correspondents as Felix K. of Oklahoma City, Mrs. PELHAM of Rosebud, Texas--O bless her heart. (The editor just noted a letter from Mrs. PELHAM dated 15 April, 1966, renewing her membership and indicating she had passed her 85th birthday March 17th. She also mentioned a cousin Carrie KIMBROUGH, Valdosta, Ga., whom the editor believes to be older. I believe both are living this date 1967.) In a year or two I expect to have more time for both research and correspondence.

Yes, I am Keith's youngest brother, your Cousin Lan's youngest child. Of eight children there are five of us left: Lizzie, the oldest, in El Paso, Texas; Andrew, 3rd oldest, in Hobbs, New Mexico; Sallie (in Nashville); Keith in Guthrie; and myself.

As you say, Thomas Winston K. was my grandfather, and your father was the half brother of my grandfather, William Landon K. (who, by the way, was named guardian of your father in Thomas Winston's will). I went away to

boarding school when quite young, but I remember you distinctly--how pretty you were. I practiced law in Elkton and Madisonville five years and then came to Rochester in late 1928. So, I am not the baby that you seem to visualize.

I am not certain as to the name of Thomas Winston K's father, but I have a strong impression from my father's accounts (he knew much about the family history, but at the age I was not very interested in the past) that his name was Marmaduke. I am pretty sure that he was a Baptist preacher and that Thomas W. was born in Virginia.

I would be very much interested to learn something of your immediate branch of the family. Where did the TERRY & TYLER come in? My grandmother K. was Penelope Boanna (?) TERRY, daughter of Robert TERRY, and that constitutes my first and middle names. And the father of cousin Underwood K. (father of Claude and Harry) married a Miss TERRY, sister of my grandmother K., so that my father and Underwood were double first cousins--their fathers being brothers. . .And where do the MIMMS & LESTERS fit into your ancestry?

You refer to Dr. ANDERSON. The only Dr. ANDERSON that I know here is Donald ANDERSON, who is Dean of the School of Medicine of the University of Rochester.

You can be sure that whenever I am near Birmingham, I'll look you up. And I certainly wish that you could come to see us. My wife is as interested in the family as I am. I have two sons, Robert Terry, Jr. (who has three children and who is a research physicist at Xerox here) and Lee, who is married and live here.

Please let me hear from you.

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P.S. Thanks to you, I have joined the Kimbro-Kimbrough Assn. and have received the back numbers of the Quarterly.

NOTE: Mr. Robert KIMBROUGH has mentioned many connecting families in this letter that I feel that there are some members or readers of the Quarterlies will be able to provide some light and likely clear up some questions asked. As an interesting sidelight to the KIMBROUGH-TERRY connection in NW Ala., in Franklin and Lawrence Counties, the KIMBROUGHS (Goldman's descendants) in Franklin and the TERRY in Lawrence have intermarried. There are many members of each family still in that area. Also, I know of one of the Gills Co., Tenn., KIMBROUGHS (Descendants of James) who married a TERRY. Mrs. Renan R. (Peggy) Kimbrough, 99 Grove Park Road, the former Margaret McClanahan Witherington, died about 3 p.m. yesterday at Methodist Hospital after a six-week illness. She was 58.

Prominent in social, church, civic and business circles, she was born at

Munford, Tenn. on land that belonged to her family even before Tennessee was a state. She was the daughter of Mrs. Annie McClanahan Witherington and the late Dr. Albert Sidney Witherington.

A former president of Le Bonheur Club and on the board of Le Bonheur Child-en's Hospital, she is listed in A. N. Marquis' Who's Who of American Women.

She also served as president of Little Glass Club, chairman of the art's Committee of the Woman's Exchange, and trustee of Memphis Academy of Arts. She was a member of Memphis Country Club, Symphony League, Opera Guild, Brooks Art Gallery League, the English Speaking Union and Le Bonheur Garden Club.

With Mr. Kimbrough, who died three years ago, she pioneered in the commercial development of the Poplar-Perkins area, with the Kimbrough Suburban Shopping Center. She also has been active in farming and cattle raising in West Tenn-essie and in other real estate developments.

She had toured the Orient, Hawaii, and the South Pacific, visited the Holy Land, made many trips to Europe and the Caribbean.

She attended Virginia College and received a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, where she was a member of Alpha Delta Pi Sorority.

"Wounded by Sniper--Sergeant Saved Dallas Marine"

"The sergeant came in standing up. He's a real Marine. I wouldn't be alive if it weren't for him and the corpsman."

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"Wounded by Sniper--Sergeant Saved Dallas Marine" cont'd.

Lance Cpl. Jay Kimbrough of Dallas was in trouble. A sniper bullet had caught him in the left hip.

"I fired another burst with my machine gun and it flipped me back over the dike," said the Texan at war.

Kimbrough, another Marine, and a Navy corpsman were caught in the middle of a rice paddy with sniper fire coming from several directions.

Members of Alpha Co., 1st battalion, 3rd Marines, they were being flown to a valley at Tam Ky where a company of the 5th Marines were in trouble with the North Vietnamese.

Kimbrough's helicopter was shot down. Three of them got out and found themselves besieged with sniper fire.

After the 19-year-old Marine was wounded and flipped over the dike, the corps-man rushed to his aid.

"He covered my body with his to protect me," he said, adding that the

corpsman also patched up the wound.

Other members of the company were in a protected area. Finally, Sgt. Jim West of Oklahoma grabbed three volunteers and set out to rescue the three. He made it.

Sgt. West was recommended for the Silver Star. "He ought to get it," Kimbrough said.

"He got wounded on the next operation but he will be back before it is over. That war will be going on for some time."

Kimbrough played baseball at his Dallas high school and was hoping to go to college on a scholarship. "I don't know if I'll be able to play good enough now," he said at the U. S. Naval Hospital in Corpus Christi.

He is the son of Mrs. Lois Kimbrough of Huntsville and Jay Kimbrough of Durant, Oklahoma.

Son of Mrs. Lucy Kimbrough, 26 months over in the SW Pacific with a Heavy Bombardment Group, inducted into the Army October 10, 1941, completed training in the States to become an expert Army Corps, Mechanic.
