A NEW ENGLAND PIONEER:

By Dr. George F. Mellen

The New England element omitted from considerations of Tennessee pioneer life would leave a palpable void. As doctors and lawyers, educators and preachers, merchants and Cherokee agents, they were early upon the scene. On the occasion of my visit to Kingston, it was a fulfilled purpose to seek out in the old Presbyterian cemetery the grave of a worthy one of the number. Early of a dewy morning amid the tangled honeysuckle that has taken large possession of the ancient God's acres, I found a broad marble slab extending the en-

tire length of the grave, and resting upon a brick foundation that is giving away. One may read with difficulty the dim inscription: "Here reposes in the silence and tranquillity of the tomb the body of Gideon Morgan, Sen., aged 78 years and 11 months."

More than sixteen years ago from the files of the Knoxville Register, I made these extracts from a notice of him in the issue of November 24, 1830: Died November 15, 1830. Born in Connecticut in 1751, where he resided to 1790. He emigrated to Augusta County, Va., where beloved by acquaintances he reared a respectable family. Afterwards he removed to Albemarle County, Va., which he left in 1810, to remove to Tennessee. He has resided at Kingston upwards of twenty years. A man of enterprise, seeking to improve the country if the course of a long and useful life he laid out as many as three towns. He was a great Mason.

Gideon Morgan's Connecticut home was in Washington township, Litchfield County where he enlisted in the Revolutionary War. His first wife was Patience, only child of Emerson Cogswell, of New Milford, Conn. Her father was an ingenious goldsmith, who interested himself much in the matter of perpetual motion. When King George III offered a large reward for its invention, he visited England on the mission and there died.

The three towns founded were Waterford, Saragotoga County, N. Y. just above Cohoes, and now a town of 3,000 inhabitants; Morgantown, about a mile west of present Ivy Depot of the C.&O. railway in Albemarle County, Va., and New Haven, in the Shenandoah Valley, across the river from the present Port Republic. Of these, the Morgantown venture was a great financial success. The lots, offered at \$50.00 each, were sold on the lottery plan, as was the custom of the time. On number 176 he had built a large brick dwelling and stable. The possibility of securing so valuable a prize for \$50.00 gave such an impetus that lottery tickets were sold not only in surrounding counties, but throughout Virginia and even Philadelphia. George Anderson, of Greenbriar, happened to be the fortunate holder, and sold the brick house to Benjamin Hardin, who kept a tavern therein down to the latter twenties.

A sister of Benjamin Hardin, Elizabeth, Morgan married as his second wife between 1805 and 1809, no children resulting from the union.

The date of his coming to East Tennessee is given as 1810. He must, there-

fore, have been preceded by his son Luther. A son of the latter, Col. Samuel

Dold Morgan, in a letter found in Guild's Old Times in Tennessee, wrote de-

fending Sam Houston against the charge of ill treatment towards Eliza Allen,

the wife so soon and suddenly abandoned. He says that he had known Houston

intimately from 1809 to his death, "first as plow-boy, my schoolmate,

bedfel-

low, and co-store boy."

The eldest son, Calvin, married at Staunton, Va., Sarah Fackler on January 20,

1801. Knoxville was his home from 1810 until his death at Red Sulphur Springs, W. Va. He was a merchant and large landowner. His store was at the

southwest corner of Gay and Main, on a part of the present courthouse square.

His landed possessions extended from about Clinch and Gay considerably north

of the Southern railroad. He gave the land for the present Deaf and Dumb asy-

lum. His eldest child was Eliza Jane, who married Matthew McClung, of Knoxville, and became the mother of Charles J., Franklin H., and Matthew McClung, eminently successful merchants. His eldest son was Franklin Henry

Morgan, early a merchant of Knoxville, in partnership with his father and Sam-

uel D. Jacobs. Later he was in business in Philadelphia, and lies buried in

Laurel Hill cemetery of that city.

The second son, Luther, married at Staunton, Va., Anne Cameron Dold, on Febru-

ary 1, 1798. For some time they lived at Staunton and were parents of Calvin

Cogswell Morgan, of Lexington, Ky. The latter married Henrietta Hunt, of Lex-

ington, and they became the parents of Gen. John Hunt Morgan, the daring raider of the Southern Confederacy and of Henrietta Hunt Morgan, wife of Gen.

Basil W. Duke, second in command to his brother-in-law, Gen. Morgan. As said,

Luther was father of Col. Samuel D. Morgan, the pre-eminent merchant and

manufacturer of Nashville, who moved to the capital city in 1833 from Huntsville, Ala., and lived there until his death in 1880. For probity and

enterprise he established himself at once. During the panic of 1837 the state

legislature, with full faith in their stability, authorized Col. Morgan's firm

to issue scrip or paper money. He built a cotton mill at Huntsville, Ala.,

another at Lebanon, Tenn., and founded the Tenn. Manufacturing Co., of Nash-

ville. Further, he was a prime mover in Tennessee railroad construction, writing the charter after which all others were modeled. He was original and

second president of the commission which built the state capital, and selected

William Strickland, the Philadelphian, as architect of that classic structure.

For ten years they worked together. Strickland, dying first, was buried

by
resolution within the walls of the north peristyle. Later on, with the
death
of his co-worker, the legislature provided by resolution that the body of
Col.
Morgan should rest within the walls of the building at the south end.
Gideon, Jr., married Margaret Sevier, daughter of Gen. John Sevier's
oldest
son, Joseph, and Elizabeth Lowrey, his wife, who was a half-blood
Cherokee and
a descendant of the great chief, Oconostota. He is buried at Calhoun,
McMinn
County, and has a number of descendants in Oklahoma, where they acquired
lands
through their Cherokee blood.
William married Miss Sewell, and was once a resident of Knoxville.

Rufus, who married Elizabeth Trigg, of Abingdon, Va., lived at Knoxville
and
afterwards at Kingston, where he died August 16, 1826. He was a man of
enter-
prise, and built the best merchant mill of its day for East Tenn. on the
east
side of First creek between Cumberland and Clinch. According to an
advertise-
ment in the Knoxville Register, he put it in operation in June 1820. Six
months afterwards James Kennedy became its purchaser. Morgans, Brown and
Guthrie advertise in the Register of Dec. 122, 1820, that they expect to
com-
mence to blowing their furnace in Green County by the 20th of Jan., and
will
make castings for any description of machinery and hollow ware. Col.
McClung
Morgan was father of Rachel Kibby Trigg, first wife of Col. Hugh L.
McClung,
and of Rhoda Campbell, who married Col. John Williams, II. Both he and
his
brother Calvin were in 1821 made trustees of East Tennessee College, now
Uni-
versity of Tennessee.
George, who married Miss Frances Irby, of Virginia, was a merchant at
Athens,
McMinn County, immediately after its establishment in 1823. He was the
father
of Senator John Tyler Morgan, of Ala., who was born at Athens in 1824,
and
with his family moved to Calhoun Co., Ala., in 1833. Other known

children of George were Irby Morgan, merchant, of Nashville, and the two wives of Judge William Parish Chilton, long of the Ala. supreme court. The only daughter of Gideon and Patience Morgan was Mary, who married first Asa Hazen, a New Englander resident in East Tenn., second Richard McPherson, and third Rev. Mr. White, a Methodist preacher. She was the mother of, among others, Gideon Morgan Hazen, long a merchant and manufacturer of Knoxville, who married Miss Mary Strong, daughter of Dr. Joseph Churchill Strong, Conn.-born, of Mary Hazen, who married Joseph Kimbrough of the Cumberland plateau, and of Rufus Morgan McPherson, late of Knoxville, who married Mary, daughter of the late Campbell Wallace of Atlanta. Certainly Gideon Morgan, Sr., was a contributor to the best life and traditions of Tennessee and the South. Of the Kimbrough branch of this family, Sarah Ann Armour married Major L. L. Thomason, then of Madison, Ga., originally of York, S. C.; a prominent man of business, vitally connected with the pioneer growth of Tenn., especially of Chattanooga. Mary Kimbrough married W. W. Neighbors, D.D., of Ala., a minister of the Holston Conference M.E.C.S. Eugene Barnard married Nancy Elizabeth Gillespie of Chattanooga, Tenn. William Kimbrough married Georgia Cady of Chattanooga, Tenn. Sarah Elma married Hugh Banks Chapman, of Detroit, Mich. (originally of Charleston, S. C.) At present date, May 31, 1915, the following remain unmarried: Joseph Theobald; David McMahan; Alice Lenore; two died in early infancy; Calvin Morgan, and Gideon Hazen.

Dr. T. J. Kimbrough was a physician here. I remember him very well as his office was just across from my school. He died many years ago and is buried in the City Cemetery. He had a son who also died and is buried there. He had a daughter, Miss Margaret Kimbrough, who died some three or four years ago in Dallas. She died in a rest home and the funeral director there called me to find if I know of relatives. She had purchased, so e said, a lot there in one of the memorial parks but had left no funds for burial. Joe Smith ought to be able to dig up information on this.

The son married one Nannie Morton; she is dead. There are no relatives living here as far as I know. They had one son, a very fine young man who as I recall graduated from Texas A. and M. College at Bryan, Texas. He could probably be located thru their alumni service.

Dr. Kimbrough was married twice. His second wife is dead and none of her people live here or know anything about the family.

I have no knowledge of his parents having moved here. The Dr. was an elderly man as I know him about the 1910's. The two children were all that I recall. Hoping this will be of some value to you.
